

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## **Churchwardens' Report**

#### Pray

The pattern of Sunday services in our two churches established in October 2017 continued throughout the year, with Communion at All Saints every Sunday at either 8.00 am or 11.00 am, and at St George's every Sunday at 9.30 am. There was a temporary disruption at St George's when the central heating boiler failed in December 2017, leaving a very cold church! So the 9.30 am service was held in the parish hall up till Easter. On 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays and Patronal Festivals, the Parish worshipped together in one of the churches or the hall.

The pattern of regular weekday services also remained unchanged with Morning Prayers on Tuesday and Friday in All Saints, and Communion every Thursday morning in St George's. In addition, from Ascension Day to Pentecost at Evening Prayer, we joined with Christians across the world to pray 'Thy Kingdom Come'. And in the period up to Remembrance Sunday in November, we again played our part in a nationwide Commemoration of the ending of the First World War one hundred years before in November 1918. Prayers for Remembrance were said, and we were joined in the two churches by transparent silhouettes of soldiers 'seen and unseen'. On Remembrance Sunday itself, we walked in procession from St George's to the Harnham Memorial Hall, where a capacity congregation remembered those who died in both World Wars, and prayed for peace.

We enjoyed 3 Bishop visits at the start on 2018. Bishop Ed visited as support for the parish, Bishop Nick came to launch the Lent talks and returned again on 22 April, for the Patronal Festival, and blessed our new icon of St George, specially commissioned as part of the celebration of the church's 900<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in 2015. We are very grateful to the artist John Coleman and the donors who funded the commission. This year also saw the publication of a history of All Saints Church painstakingly compiled by William Alexander, to whom we are much indebted.

We were delighted to welcome back Revd Becky in May on phased return after her illness. Revd Heather completed her curacy in November, and we wished her well as she left us on maternity leave, before she takes up her new appointment as incumbent of St Mary's, Old Basing. They were both wonderfully supported by our associate priest, Revd Julian, and our dedicated and flexible team of retired clergy to whom we are enormously indebted. As ever, Linda Baker provided crucial administrative support to the whole clerical team, and to the Parish in general.

Details of repairs and improvements to the two church buildings are set out in the property Committee report. The most significant item was the replacement of the boiler at St George's. The new boiler was commissioned in June, thanks particularly to the diligent efforts of Peter and Helen Evans, and the generous financial support of an anonymous donor.

#### Serve

The day to day running of our churches depends on a large team of dedicated volunteers, who serve in a huge range of capacities, including as sidespersons, servers, readers, chalice assistants and intercessors, as flower arrangers and cleaners, in providing clean linen for communion services, in carrying out minor repairs, in caring for the churchyards, and in serving refreshments before and after services. We are enormously grateful to all who contribute in these vital but often unseen ways. At the same time, we are very aware that we are all getting older, people's circumstances change or they move away, so that there is a constant need for others to step forward and take on a role. In the coming months, we will be exploring new ways of encouraging and supporting congregational members and others from the wider community to contribute their skills and their time to the Parish.

On 22 July, we gathered after the morning service at St George's for coffee and cake to say thank you to Jane Pelly for her many years of service to the Parish, and to present her with a Certificate from the Bishop acknowledging her many years as a Lay Reader in the parish. At All Saints, particular tribute was paid to Irene Wells, who stepped down as an LPA, having served the parish in many capacities over many years. Robert Salkeld ceased to be churchwarden in April, but has continued to provide invaluable support to the churchwarden team. We are particularly grateful to others who have retired from, or joined, the many rotas.

#### Grow

The Parish continued to stand out from other parishes in the deanery in the number of Occasional Offices offered in our churches. During the year, St George's welcomed 4 couples for their wedding, baptised 7 children and I adult member of our congregation, and performed 10 funerals and burials of ashes. At All Saints, there were 5 baptisms, 3 weddings, 5 funerals and 2 burials of ashes. Each in its own way offered a valuable opportunity to reach out beyond our regular congregations.

Messy Church met every month in the Parish Hall, but on the congregation of children, their parents, and helpers periodically moved across to St George's for a short service, as also did members of the Toddlers Groups that meet in the Hall on Mondays and Wednesdays.

Major festivals, particularly Christmas, also offered similar opportunities. All Saints hosted two Nativity services on Christmas Eve, such was the demand from local families, as well as Harnham Junior School's Easter and Harvest Festival services. At St George's, we were delighted to welcome parents and children from the two Toddlers' groups for their Nativity Service, the Uniformed Organisations for their Carol Service, and the Alzheimers' Society Music for the Mind group for their Carol Service. Also at Christmas, Remembering Stars for mourners were available in both churchyards, and much appreciated.

During Lent, All Saints played host to a series of talks under the title 'The Cross I carry', which were greatly appreciated. In Advent, there were four evenings of Reflection at St George's. Both series were followed by Compline. We are grateful particularly to Joanna Woodd for her efforts in bringing them into being.

Coffee on Saturday mornings at All Saints continues to bring together regulars and passers-by for a chat over a drink, and for a while also offered a place for people to come to book weddings or baptisms. Both churches welcomed the Wiltshire Historic Churches Ride and Stride in September.

The development of the Parish's Eco Church Policy has highlighted the role of our churchyards as valuable oases of peace and beauty. As a first step in developing this further, volunteers created a Bug Hotel in All Saints churchyard, and bird feeders now adorn the trees in both churchyards. The next year will see these plans taken further.

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## PCC Committee Reports

#### **Parish Hall and Transformation Project**

Committee: Jane Greenaway (Chair), Chris King (Architect), Linda Baker, Geoff Gilbert, Tony Mercer, Helen Evans and Paula Price.

Remit:

- Hall Extension
- Promote best use of the hall as a building that serves the community
- Plan and review the upkeep of the hall

Early in 2018 Harvey and Snowdon completed the Structural report. It clearly showed that the buttresses can be removed and there will be iron work to replace them. The architect has all the necessary information to complete the plans for the builders. It was agreed to hold off requesting builders quotes until we have a significant part of the funding, otherwise the quotes would expire and need updating.

The hall users are kept informed of progress, at their meeting in March 2018 and by visits to individual groups.

In anticipation of the need for some storage when the work begins, the PCC purchased a container. It may seem presumptuous but renting or purchasing containers are extremely expensive so when we heard

of one available locally at a very reasonable price from a parishioner we took advantage of it. (It is hoped when the work is complete we can sell it on).

Although still dealing with day to day matters of the hall this committee is now unable to do much more until we are in a position to start chasing for quotes from builders.

## Parish Hall Transformation Project Fundraising Committee.

Remit: Simply to raise awareness and funds for the Hall Transformation Project.

Committee met for the first time at the end of July, with a Hall Fundraising Launch on Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> September 2018. The group agreed that instead of a thermometer to show how the fundraising is going we would have a river scene with ducks - each duck would represent £20,000. It then seemed appropriate that our first major fundraiser was to be a Duck Race by the Old Mill. Before Christmas we submitted an application to the National Lottery for funding, this is expected to be a long process. Subsequent meetings in 2018 were spent discussing and organising fundraising events for 2019, with the idea of sending out a flyer to as many houses in Harnham as possible, to advertise the events and raise awareness of what we are doing.

## **Worship Committee**

- Plan special services
- Plan music for services
- Plan and review learning about the Christian faith

#### <u>Pray</u>

Intercessions In June, Revd Canon David Durston and Revd Heather led an intercessions workshop for all who lead. Ten people came to the workshop. The workshop looked at what

people valued in intercessions, analysed examples of intercessory prayers, and gave guidance on the wider context of the Christian year.

<u>Public morning prayer</u> This returned in May, on Revd Becky's return, as well as a new service 'Friday prayers around the cross'. The focus of Friday prayers is the psalms and ten minutes of silent intercession on a rotating theme - victims of torture and slavery, helping organisations, the hungry and homeless, the caring professions, prisoners and the prison system, victims of natural disaster, minorities and immigrants. The prayer group stopped meeting this year and Revd Becky encouraged pray-ers to join in the public prayer on Fridays. Between 1-5 people attend midweek prayers.

<u>Thy Kingdom Come</u> Between 6-8 people attended each half hour prayer time during the mornings and afternoons of 'Thy Kingdom Come' from Ascension to Pentecost Sunday. Most of the sessions were held in the churches, except the annual prayer walk up the Harnham Slope on Ascension Day. Afternoons included prayers that were more creative and involved interaction. The next steps would be to take prayers out into the schools for this week in 2019.

<u>100 years since the end of WW1</u> During the week leading up to November 11<sup>th</sup>.both churches were open for half an hour each day with prayers for peace. 6-8 people attended each. The evening half hour event, using candlelight, at AS and Saturday morning event after coffee, to include those who work during the day, were not so well attended. The Service of Remembrance included a march from St George's to All Saints which involved the Brownies, Scouts and Guides. The service included excerpts from the lives of those who had lived in Harnham read by younger members of the congregations as well as a specific focus on peace. Over 190 people attended.

#### <u>Serve</u>

<u>Women's Refuge</u> Harvest gifts for the Refuge were well received. There was a record number of gift tokens donated at the Gift services. Once again, the families from the Refuge were very appreciative.

<u>Community</u> Harvest flowers and donations were organised for those alone or infirm.

<u>Service for the Bereaved</u> was attended by 70 people; Blue Christmas was attended by 8 people and both were very much appreciated by those who had experienced different kinds of bereavement over the years.

#### <u>Grow</u>

Sermons and Learning Lent talks, with guest speakers, challenged were organised by Joanna Woodd and challenged people to think about social justice.

Two Pilgrim courses were run by Revd Heather during the course of the year. 8-12 people attended each. The Pilgrim course uses discussion and a spiritual practice of Lectio Divina to aid reflection and prayer. Feedback from those who attended included the enjoyment of learning together, learning new parts of theology and practices in church, prayer and companionship.

In the feedback from a questionnaire to both All Saints and St George's congregations various suggestions were made for further Pilgrim courses, sermons and reflections for Lent and Advent. Advent talks were based on guided scripture meditations and modern art and were well attended. A sermon series on the book of Ephesians was held over 6 weeks.

One of the aims of the Mission and Vision committee is to enable '**Congregational participation** in learning and leadership.' This needs to be prioritised in 2019.

<u>Christmas services</u> All Christmas services were well attended. The Children's Nativity services were up in attendance this year to over 180 people. Revd Penny Joyce led an interactive service, including nativity characters.

<u>Schools worship</u> The Infant School held their Harvest service, under Revd Penny Joyce and Revd Heather's guidance, for the first time this year. Revd Penny is now the parish link with the Infant School.

<u>Messy Church</u> has shown the most growth, out of the four congregations i.e. new people attending. Children now co- lead the worship.

#### **Practicalities**

Several retired clergy led services during Revd Heather and Revd Becky's absence. Feedback from the congregations suggests that the different styles of sermons were appreciated. Services, on request of the Diocese, were reduced to two each Sunday, one in All Saints and one in St George's. Service times will be reconsidered in 2019, as a result of research and prayerful vision. Revd Heather returned from maternity leave in January 2018. Amongst many other things, she continued to lead worship on Thursday mornings and Sundays as well as being the main contact for 'Christening' families. She also led Saint George's Patronal Festival Service, at which the Bishop of Salisbury blessed the St George icon, and also held a Taizé style Pentecost service. Her final service was a united service for 'Christ the King' in November and she has now secured a new post in Winchester Diocese.

#### New forms of worship, will be discussed as part of the Parish vision so that services

- a. consider the culture we now live in
- b. are aimed at people we want to serve and grow in faith in our community Research and action will be taken in 2019.

## **Churches Together/Deanery Synod**

Representatives: Joanna Woodd and David Baker also 2 vacant positions.

The website strapline for Salisbury Churches together reads "Salisbury churches working together to do God's work in this city". At our meetings we have been learning more about new initiatives, such as the pastoral work at Old Sarum Housing Development, and progress reports of current projects, such as the Bridge Youth Project, Youth Hub, Men's Sheds,



Salisbury Street Pastors, Alabare Christian Care & Support. It is this group which organises the Good Friday March of Witness, the pulpit and congregational swops, Christian Aid Week besides other inter church events.

However, it is as being Anglican, that we have responsibility for all of Salisbury, The Deanery includes St Thomas' St. Martin's and St Pauls' and Cathedral in the inner ring, and Bemerton, St Marks', St Francis' and Harnham in the outer ring. Under the leadership of our new Rural Dean, Kelvin Inglis we have been reviewing our aims, noting the imbalance of the workload amongst the parishes with the geographical location of schools, new housing estates etc. Over the course of the year, the strategic plan has been scrutinised making sure that the various communities are linked to a church and receiving appropriate support, this includes Travellers, the Homeless/ Rough Sleepers. This new plan is not based on trying to justify why more clergy are required, but how we might work better together, and to share the work needed in schools, on housing estates etc. within the Deanery.

The Deanery is rich with its diversity of tradition, but it is recognised that we need to be prepared to work across our parish boundaries, in order to meet the needs of the people in Salisbury, for example St Thomas' has no schools, whereas Harnham has two.

The financial challenges and possible solutions for the Deanery have been discussed within the vision "Renewing Hope – Pray Serve Grow. Lastly the deanery is very keen for Salisbury to have a formal link with a Diocese in South Sudan.

As for most worship, we never know how many families will arrive but usually around 40 people are provided with a tea (by another great team of people). More details were given at the Vision day. The team of volunteers this year have continued to be dedicated and reliable which I am sure has been a big factor in the growth and enjoyment of all who attend. We thank God for them all and especially Katharine Callard who is now involved more in the background but has helped run Messy Church since we started it. We also thank David Paterson who has moved to pastures new and so a big 'thank you' to everyone.

EVERYONE is welcome to come along- as some did for the Christingle Messy Church. It is a way to explore the bible and praise Jesus through fun, laughter and joy, using a more relaxing and sharing approach.

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## Harnham Junior School

Our **School Community** at present consists of roughly 350 Children in 12 Classes, 17 Teachers, 16TAs, 6 Support Staff & 10 Governors, and of course we must remember to include the parents. The Foundation Governors from the local churches are **David Stone** and **Helen Evans**. **Becky** as Vicar is the ex-officio Foundation Governor. **The Buildings.** Those of you who pass the school regularly will have noticed considerable construction activity. For many years the school has operated using a number of temporary classrooms to house some of the children and staff; those temporary buildings now need replacing so it has been decided to build a new set of permanent classrooms for those in the temporary buildings.

The project has inevitably caused considerable disruption; we have lost most of our playground space and the children are currently using the playing field, hence every day is a welly boot day. Also a great deal of protective fencing has been placed around the building site so moving between many classes is no longer a direct route. It must also be said that these goings on have also produced much excitement among the children, with strangers in unusual gear and the close proximity of large machines and vehicles it is only to be expected.

Despite the recent upheaval of building work, the life of the school has continued as usual. The new intake settled in successfully last September and now fully established. Academically the staff at the school provide a good and secure place in which to learn and closely assess the children in order to have the most appropriate strategy in place for each child to maximize their achievements.

A range of clubs to offer less academic interest for children have been arranged, including knitting and gardening, the latter thanks to the Harnham Society and our parent support advisor has also arranged first aid workshops for parents and any other adult who is interested.

#### The School and our Church community.

The role of coordinator for school assemblies and RE has now been taken up by Mrs Jess Martindale. Rev Becky and David Stone have had meetings with her to support her in her plans for these areas of school life.

Both Harvest and Christmas have been celebrated by the children supported by our clergy. At both festivals funds and donations were raised to support local charities.

A particularly notable event was the remembrance of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the 1<sup>st</sup> World War. The Junior School came together with our neighbours, Harnham Infant School, in the infant school playground.

The wall and railings of the playground were curtained with a net of poppies made by the children and staff, and a cross had been placed in a prominent position.

Wreaths were laid at the cross and readings and prayers offered. Whilst the weather played a suitably bleak role with rain and wind; the children demonstrated a solemnity on the anniversary of a war the like of which we pray will never be repeated and that hopefully they will only know of through their studies.

Following on the previous year where Revd Becky was on long term sick leave the group continued to work with other committees to make sure events/services happened. Not usually part of the group's remit, but with Joanna's help they organised Lent talks on the theme "The Crosses We Carry" which were well attended.

The Mission and Vision committee began 2018 by reviewing the Parish's Mission Action Plan, as the current document was for 2014-16. The group updated what they could in Revd Becky's absence and added new deadline dates for projects that they felt Becky would wish to do.

- Introduction of a Sermon Series on Ephesians.

On Revd Becky's return the group concentrated on preparing and planning for a Vision Afternoon and a way forward for the parish. All of which would have a bearing on the Mission Action Plan.

A good year for the Events committee, events organised included:

#### Quiz Evening (January)

This was a great evening. All tables were sold and this year we served a ploughman's and hot soup. Committee agreed this is a good annual event as it attracts people from the local community.

#### Church Fete

This proves to be a good event. Well attended and raises a good sum for the church. This year we found that people stayed, and we believe this was due to the bouncy castle keeping the children happy and for the first time having a bar. Families sat down on the field and enjoyed the entertainment and music. It's an event that really needs in the region of 40 volunteers to work.

#### Harnham Fun Day

This was an event organised by Salisbury City Council and held on the Cricket Field. We had a couple of stalls, Messy Church activities and a pocket money games stall. The whole event was very well attended and probably due to the fact it was advertised as a free event and most activities were free. Committee are keen to be involved again if the council do one again in 2019.

#### Hymns and Pimms

This event attracts both church and community. 57 attended in 2018. All agreed having a last night of the Proms at the end makes the event.

#### Pet Festival

This is a growing event that encourages non-church people to attend. Pet Service and Dog Show are very popular. In 2019 we plan to make more of the afternoon, encouraging different animals, and to promote the local countryside and environment.

100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the ending of the Great War.

The plans for 2015 prevented us making more of the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the start of the war so three events were planned: an Old Time Music Hall, a Talk on Aviation in the Great War, and a parade to the Remembrance Sunday service. All attracting attendance from outside and within the church community.

#### <u>"There But Not There" Silhouettes.</u>

We were successful in receiving some of these silhouettes from the Armed Forces Covenant Trust Fund, and part of the condition of the grant was to organise events that would make people aware of the Armed Forces today, and to invite veterans to the events. They were displayed in the churches and the events.

#### Old Time Music Hall

Around 67 attended an afternoon of war time songs, sketches and stories. A light-hearted event with poignant messages at which the silhouettes were shown amid sandbags.

#### Talk on Aviation in the Great War

The talk was given by David Baker and was attended by around 57 people many from outside the church community. Again the silhouettes provided a reminder of the fallen.

#### <u>Remembrance Sunday Parade</u>.

Over the months leading up to Remembrance Sunday members of the community made poppies, which were displayed in the churches, Memorial Hall and on the parade route from St George's to the Memorial hall. First time we have paraded to the Remembrance Sunday service and both the parade and service were very well attended.

#### **Beer and Carols**

This was again held at the Old Mill with over 100 people attended despite a cold evening. Prices for Mulled Wine was much better than previous years and the Old Mill served food too. Evening was enjoyed by all.

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## **Associate Priest's Report**

It has been a busy year as School Chaplain at King Edward VI School and Stroud School as well as assisting in the parish over some challenging months. It has been good to support Linda and the wardens, to contribute to the magazine and to share in ministry with the great team of retired clergy and lay folks. It was a joy to welcome Bishops Ed and Nick to the parish especially for the dedication of the new St George Icon. In September it was good to attend the installation of the new dean.

One of the most enriching of experiences at King Edwards was running another of the charitable projects at the School, now working with a primary school in Sholing - again with a mix of our sixth form students and

Year 5 pupils. The week in July proved an education for all involved and as I expected the KES students were generous and unconditional in their care and support of the youngsters. They were a fine inspiration and role model for those we sought to aspire to look beyond their horizons.

Resources from the Salisbury diocese were invaluable as I met daily with colleagues to pray during Lent. We have continued to meet throughout the year. School life involves the privilege of speaking with individuals and to the whole community in assemblies and services. I especially enjoy working with pupils to prepare and lead the Schools' carol services in Romsey Abbey, as well as the annual Service of Thanksgiving as well as beginning the planning of the triennial version held in Winchester Cathedral. The baptising of a colleague's child and helping others prepare for marriage was once again a joy. The anniversary of the death of Ben, a fine young fifteen year old whilst out for an evening run, gave an opportunity to dedicate part of the school's fitness suite in his memory.

November saw the marking of the end of the 1918 war and at School we dedicated a new war memorial garden and powerful bronze sculpture representing fallen pupils.

It became public that the long-standing Head Master, with whom I have worked closely for the last seventeen years was to retire. I was part of the initial conversations with those charged with recruiting his replacement.

It is very important for me in my School ministry to have the sacramental and prayerful links with Harnham. Easter fell at the end of term, so something powerful could be made of Maundy Thursday and the constant encouragement to the pupils to use their gifts and privilege, now and in their futures, to be of service to the wider community and to God's glory. Keeping the great festival was a great source of renewal at the end of a demanding term.

Over and above the prayers and good wishes, the pattern of worship and fellowship is vital in supporting what can be a solitary activity in a context outside the normal structures of Church. Sharing in the rhythm of festivals, scripture and friendship is a joy. What could be more fun than a sunny afternoon at the fete, walking the parish bounds or Saturday morning coffee?

Libby's work with the South Wilts A Cappella Choir, and mine by proxy and as a member of the choir, allows us to speak of faith, to unpack scripture when preparing the youngsters to sing evensongs or services in Salisbury, Winchester and Oxford. The SWGS carol service in the Cathedral is a privilege to shape and gladdens the heart to be a part of. Similarly, performing sacred music in concert affords a chance to reflect on the beliefs being expressed there. I am pleased that many members of the Harnham community have enjoyed coming to their performances.

It is a particular joy to facilitate the Parish Carol service, with youngsters, parishioners and friends gathering on the afternoon to rehearse and then lead the service. Libby and I have tried over the years to incorporate children from the parish and the city, particularly those known to us through our work and our own children. As a result many alumni ask to be involved year after year, some for more than twelve years, often travelling from far-flung parts of the UK - and for many Christmas isn't really complete without this connection with our parish.

It is greatly enriching to share in the worship through the seasons at All Saints and St George's. I think the eight o' clock communion service at All Saints is a particular favourite to attend and lead. The simplicity and calm where one can experience God's presence is potent. The fellowship and faithfulness of the congregation across the different services and activities to serve the community are inspiring. I am grateful and have enjoyed receiving the ministry of other ministers in Revd. Becky's absence and Revd. Heather's maternity leave. In the summer and autumn it was very good to support Revd Becky's return to work and once again to learn and receive so much from her ministry to us. I hope I have been able to of service to our congregations and community, as well as a resource and sounding board for Linda and the churchwardens over this period.
