From the Assistant Curate



Changing seasons; changing lives

It is November and we have seen our beautiful trees and hedges change colour, many becoming autumn gold. There is no better time to wander along Harnham Slope, Middle Street Meadow or through Harnham Water Meadows to take in the wonderful colours of our natural world in our local environment. They do this because throughout most of the year the colours of autumn are masked by green chlorophyll which helps trees to absorb the energy of the sunlight during the summer months making the leaves predominantly green. As the weather cools in autumn, the leaves start to receive less sunlight. Less sunlight triggers chlorophyll to break down revealing the colourful pigments underneath and treating us to beautiful autumn yellows and oranges (see <https://www.forestryengland.uk>). In some trees we may also see fiery reds, caused by the synthesis of a chemical called anthocyanins (see US National Library of Medicine, <https://pubmed.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/articles/PMC125091>). Then finally the leaves begin to die. They do this because the trees can no longer benefit from them in the winter and so the leaves are shed to make room for new growth in spring. This then helps the tree to make it through the winter before new growth begins in the spring.

In the Church calendar, at the same time as the leaves fall, we proceed quickly towards the Christmas season of Advent. By the time the leaves have finished falling, Advent will have started! This is a time that marks the beginning of the Church year. It is a time for reflection in darkness, for renewal of hope and for a movement towards a new beginning. As the trees shed their leaves to both survive the winter and make room for new growth, so Christian belief is that we are called to shed our old selves in order to make room for new beginnings as we follow Jesus. This allows the light of Christ into our fractured lives. In this, as we let go of our old habits, goals and ambitions we consider that we die to self and are made new in Christ; re-orientating our hearts, minds and desires to align with God's purposes for this world. As the writer to the Hebrews says in one of my favourite Bible verses,

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

This season, Jesus invites you to release your burdens; the things you carry that would hinder new growth, to him and he will give you rest. Would you then join with Jesus in bringing light and life to our challenging, broken and often dark world, taking us all toward a new heaven and a new earth?

Perhaps you might like to pray this prayer:

Lord, there are many things that I carry that weigh me down and prevent me from living a full life. Yet you have told us that you bring life, and life to the full. Through faith in you and your promises, I want to surrender these things to you and to follow you by faith and with thanksgiving in my heart for what you have done, and to serve your purposes in my life. Fill me with the power of your Holy Spirit that I may be renewed, refined and led by you. Amen

The Mothers' Union's Global Day of Action will be held on Saturday 30th November when thousands of members across the world will hold special services in churches and cathedrals, prayer vigils and marches. At 1.03pm members are asked to hold a one minute silence to remember and pray for all those who suffer from, and have suffered from, all forms of violence. In 2023 members in dioceses all around the world, including Brisbane, South Africa, Exeter, Myanmar, Democratic Republic of Congo to Auckland, took part in the 16 days of Activism Against gender-based violence.

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ECO CHURCH

Are we ready for GOLD?

As you all know, we have achieved silver awards for both churches with the La Rocha UK Eco Church movement caring for God's creation. We are all agreed that nature is crying out for our attention and care, and is dependent on our response.

Since the Parish signed up with La Rocha in 2018, and formulated its initial Eco policy in January 2019, we have, as an organisation made many changes and achieved a lot. Our worship includes hymns and prayers concerned for the environment, there are sermons and teaching themes on caring for God's earth, and there are regular articles and communications in our notice sheets and parish magazine.

We have measured the energy use in our buildings, calculated our carbon footprint, and are setting sufficient targets to reduce the CO2 output. Our current energy suppliers use renewable resources and/or charged according to their 'green tariff. Most of our lighting is now with LED bulbs. We use recyclable paper and print on both sides. Our cleaning products are mainly eco-friendly, and we offer recycling facilities for the wider community.

We have devised mowing regimes for the two churchyards, which encourage wildlife, the wildflowers, nesting birds, butterflies, dragonflies and more recently hedgehogs and grass snakes. And we encourage the community to enjoy and reflect on the abundance of God's creation.

With the local community we offer a harvest table and encourage the enjoyment of food that is LOAF Locally grown, Organic, Animal -friendly Fairtrade.

BUT to reach GOLD needs all of us to examine 'how we live'. Are there any changes we can make to live 'greener lifestyles'? Are we all using LED light bulbs? Are all our energy supplies using renewable resources? How do I/we travel to church, could I/we offer a lift? What happens to my/our left-over foods? Do I/we try to reduce, re-use, recycle our waste? Has my/our energy consumption gone down?

Previously I have invited people to discover their own personal carbon footprint, and if you did so, I wonder if it has gone down? The WWF.Footprint Calculator, is a fun and easy to use website with immediate results. Do try it, and I hope you too will enjoy the challenge. My carbon footprint was calculated to be 8.1 tonnes, and that included a trip to Australia last Christmas.

December 1st - Advent Sunday United Communion Service at All Saints 10am

Remembrance – and gratitude

This year Remembrance includes several significant dates from past wars.

2024 marks the 110th anniversary of the start of World War I.

2024 marks 80 years since D-Day. The Normandy Landings of 6th June were the largest seaborne invasion in history, and began the Allied invasion of Normandy, which led to the liberation of France and laid the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front.

2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino in Italy, the bloodiest battle of the Italian Campaign, when Allied forces finally broke through the Germans' notorious 'Gustav Line' and freed Route Six and the way to Rome.

2024 marks the 80th anniversary of the battles for Kohima and Imphal, where in northeast India the Imperial Japanese Army was held off by much smaller numbers of British and Indian troops. In Kohima alone, the defenders held off a staggering 25 Japanese attacks over 14 days in appalling conditions. When Indian troops arrived to relieve the defenders, the Japanese encirclement was broken. Amongst the liberators was Havildar Major Rajindar Singh Dhatt of the Royal Indian Army Service Corps, from the Punjab.

2024 also marks the 80th anniversary of Operation Market Garden in the Netherlands, when the Allies managed to free Eindhoven and Nijmegen, but famously failed to capture the bridge at Arnhem. (The story is told in the film *A Bridge too Far*)

As the British Legion says, "While D-Day was fundamental to the allied victory, the Second World War was not won on any single day – or battle – and we will recognise and pay tribute to all who served from the British Armed Forces, Commonwealth and allied nations, such as those who served in the Battles of Monte Cassino, Imphal and Kohima, Operation Market Garden and the Scheldt.

This year the British Legion is also looking beyond the Second World War, to Kosovo and Afghanistan.

It wants to pay tribute to those who served and currently serve in Kosovo 25 years after the deployment of the NATO peacekeeping force, KFOR, and to those who served in Afghanistan, as this year marks 10 years since the end of Operation Herrick.

EIGHTY YEARS IN CHURCH MUSIC - Part 1

a short reflection from Malcolm Sturgess

(edited by Revd Becky to fit in the magazine).

It was in early October 1944 that my mother took me along to our village church to join the choir. Since then I have sung in church choirs, conducted, played the organ, keyboard or whatever. I have also led services in church, and in care homes etc., including for over twenty years at Glenside, in South Newton. I regularly planned and led school assemblies and carol services for 28 years, again choosing nearly all the music. Hymns are really my thing: for 22 years I have been a member of The Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland, which is associated with several other similar societies all over the world, attending 19 national conferences (speaking at six of them) and international conferences in Nova Scotia and Cambridge.

All this started at Brookwood, this side of Woking, in October 1944, when I was nine. Within months I was quite clear in my head about some hymns, that they were good hymns – and some which I thought were rubbish. Not just fun to sing or not. Whilst teaching a boy called Stephen, I was told “Sir, I don’t like the hymns Mrs. Fields is choosing”. “Don’t you, Stephen? Why not?” “They’re too simple,” he said. “There ought to be mystery in religion”. There ought to be mystery in religion. Stephen enjoyed singing hymns he didn’t understand, because they made him realise there was something out there, something which he could reach out to, and which might be for him.

I think almost everybody likes *Crown Him with many crowns*. But why would they? Basically, good words, good tune, and a good match between the two. I think verse 5 could claim to be one of the best verses in all hymnody. I hear some people saying, “What nine-year-old can understand ‘potentate of time’ or ‘ineffably sublime’.....?” Most intelligent nine-year-olds can, near enough, from the context and they can enjoy juggling with such marvellous words.

Hark, hark, my soul was in the 1933 MHB and the 1950 A & M Revised, but I’m not aware that it has been included in any later hymn book. So how did it come to impress itself on my childhood mind? The very basic tune is in a different league from the others, though perfectly singable, so it must be the words. These were inspired by a passage in Romans, ch. 13: “The night is far gone, the day is near; let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light.” I can only assume that these words reflected our own situation in late 1944.

The story behind 'To God be the Glory!'

Fanny Crosby (1820 – 1915), the American singer and musician, was blind from the age of six weeks. She married her music teacher, Alexander Van Alstyne, who was also blind. She was a prolific song-writer, and once signed a contract with a publisher to write three songs every week throughout the year. But in fact, she wrote thousands during her lifetime.

Although American evangelists Moody and Sankey used this hymn on their missions, it did not become an immediate favourite. But after Billy Graham featured it in his Haringay Crusade in 1954, Londoners were soon singing it on their way home, in streets and busy queues and underground trains.

When Dr Graham took it back to the United States and introduced it at his Crusade in Nashville, Tennessee, it soon took its place in the group of top favourites hymns.

To God be the glory, great things He hath done,
So loved He the world that He gave us His Son,
Who yielded His life our redemption to win,
And opened the life-gate that all may go in.

Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,

Let the earth hear His voice;

Praise the Lord, praise the Lord,

Let the people rejoice;

Oh, come to the Father, through Jesus the Son,

And give Him the glory; great things He hath done.

Oh, perfect redemption, the purchase of blood,
To every believer the promise of God;
The vilest offender who truly believes,
That moment from Jesus a pardon receives.

Great things He hath taught us, great things He hath done,
And great our rejoicing through Jesus the Son;
But purer, and higher, and greater will be
Our wonder, our transport when Jesus we see.

The Rt Revd Timothy Dudley-Smith RIP

Bishop Dudley-Smith's ashes were interred on October 18th at St Michael and All Angels Church Winterbourne Earls.

He lived in the parish for many years with his wife Arlette. He wrote 400 hymns to make the love of God known. TDS will long be remembered for *Tell Out My Soul*, and also my favourite - *I Will Lift My Eyes to the Quiet Hills*. This is Psalm 121 sung in hymn time, by a whole congregation. The metre matters! Everyone gets it unless that is, you can't hear the rhythm, which is very rare. Then there's the tune which holds the same mood within the beat.

The great John Bell, who was speaking at St Thomas's Church in September, explained that the spiritual *It's Me, It's Me, O Lord* is sung nowadays to an energetic beat and this has changed the original slave song. Not every hymn is meant to be cheerful he said, moods vary. Bishop Timothy's *Tell Out My Soul* is a headliner whereas *I Will Lift My Eyes* is a reflective prayer.

65 years ago, on 1st Nov 1959 that the first stretch of the M1 motorway opened in Britain. Britain's first motorway service station also opened at Watford Gap.

60 years ago, on 23rd Nov 1964 that the Second Vatican Council allowed the use of vernacular languages (such as English) in Roman Catholic sacraments and rituals, including the Mass. It had insisted on using only Latin for several hundred years.

50 years ago, on 8th Nov 1974 that British aristocrat Lord Lucan disappeared from his home in London after his children's nanny was bludgeoned to death and his wife was attacked. There were hundreds of claims of sightings around the world in the following years, but none were substantiated. He was never found and is presumed dead.

Also 50 years ago, on 20th Nov 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse faked his death by leaving a pile of clothing on a beach in Miami, Florida. He was found alive and well in Australia on 24th Dec, and was arrested on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.

Also 50 years ago, on 25th Nov 1974 that South African heart surgeon Dr Christian Barnard performed the world's first double heart transplant.

40 years ago, on 25th Nov 1984 that 36 musicians gathered in London to record the Band Aid single *Do They Know It's Christmas* to raise money for famine relief in Ethiopia.

30 years ago, on 14th Nov 1994 that the first fare-paying passengers travelled through the Channel Tunnel linking England and France.

Also 30 years ago, on 19th Nov 1994 that Britain's first National Lottery draw was held.

25 years ago, on 29th Nov 1999 that the Northern Ireland Assembly appointed its first power sharing executive committee.

15 years ago, on 26th Nov 2009 that the Murphy Commission of Inquiry published its damning report on the abuse of children by Roman Catholic priests in Dublin during 1975 - 2004. It was found that church leaders had conspired with the Garda to cover up the abuse.

10 years ago, on 3rd Nov 2014 that the One World Trade Centre officially opened in New York City. It replaced the World Trade Centre that was destroyed in the 9/11 terrorist attacks in 2001.

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What's the Big Idea? -

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament

Luke is the third of the synoptic gospels. This gospel and Acts were both written for Theophilus, a Roman official, who acted as Luke's patron to ensure that his gospel was copied and distributed. It was intended for a wider audience, to help both Gentile believers and unbelievers understand who Jesus was and that the gospel is intended for the whole world.

Luke's account of Jesus' life and ministry can be divided into 4 main sections: the coming and early life of Jesus (1:1 - 4:13); Jesus' ministry in and around Galilee (4:14 - 9:50); His ministry (mainly teaching) on the road to Jerusalem (9:51 - 24:53) and His final week in Jerusalem (19:28 - 24:53).

For Luke, the key focus is how God's plan of salvation for the world is fulfilled in Jesus. Therefore he writes an orderly account ranging from the birth of Jesus to His ascension. He is a strong champion of the outsider. As an outsider himself (a Gentile writer in the NT) he shows how Jesus includes those who are typically seen as outsiders by the religious establishment of His day. This includes women, the poor and sinners (incl. tax collectors, prostitutes and shepherds!), as well as showing how Gentiles, Samaritans and Jews are all included in God's plan of salvation. Luke also emphasises the importance of prayer in Jesus' ministry and the role of the Holy Spirit.

A key verse which reflects this perspective is found when Jesus encounters the tax collector Zacchaeus, *For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost* (19:10). Whenever we find ourselves on the outside of God's life and love, as Zacchaeus, Jesus comes to find us and welcome us afresh into His kingdom.

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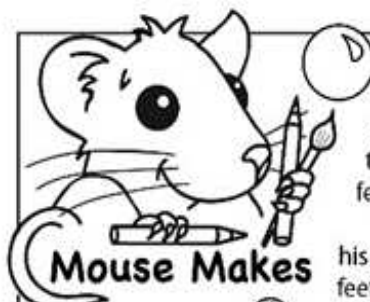

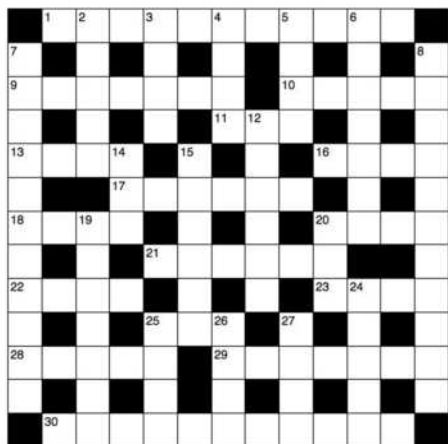
