Dear Friends,

I wonder what Christmas means to you?

Perhaps it brings back memories of childhood – of going to see Father Christmas, of school nativity plays and carol singers knocking at your door, of Christmas day with family and the excitement and expectation of opening your presents.

Perhaps it means endlessly trying to find just the *right* present for all those family and friends you have to buy for. Perhaps it means a continual round of shopping for all that food which you don't actually need. Or, like the rest of the year, struggling to make ends meet.

Perhaps it means constantly checking the diary to make sure you're in the right place at the right time. With so many things happening in Church and in the community – not to mention the family, I know it's something I find myself doing a great deal at this time of the year! The weeks leading up to Christmas are invariably busy for most of us.

And I hope that for you it means too the opportunity to experience once more the wonder, awe and mystery of Christ's birth in that meagre stable in Bethlehem; to rejoice at God's coming to earth and his never-ending love for the whole of mankind.

Advent, the weeks leading up to Christmas, should be one of the most joyful times of year, but it can become one of the most stressful. It's a season loaded with expectation, but sadly it can also be overtaken with disappointment or grief. It can become a time when all the demands and expectations that we experience each day can reach a peak.

Regularly at this time of the year I search my bookcase for a small book which was first published way back in 2008. It's written by the then Bishop of Reading and currently Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell and has the intriguing title 'Do Nothing Christmas is Coming'. Described as 'an advent calendar with a difference' the book doesn't literally advocate doing nothing, but suggests short, practical steps to help us slow down, take time out each day and resist the pressure of the Christmas whirl.

If you're feeling stressed at this time of year, take some time out and remember that Advent is not really about shopping for presents, decorating the tree, sending cards, enjoying parties and making lists. What it's really about is expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation, joyful preparation and welcoming God into our lives each and every day.

ECO CHURCH

"Unity is the only hope for our world"

As we look forward to celebrating Christmas, with all the 'hope' the Christ-child brings, let me share information, which is full of hope for our planet.

I have written previously about the 'Earthshot Prize' organisation, which has now announced the 15 winners for 2024. They are young pioneering visionary people from across the world, who have set up projects, which will either revive and restore our oceans, work towards constructing a waste free world, protect and restore nature or work towards clean air for all.

I expect some of you, like me, may feel the mighty Amazon has almost reached a tipping point of no return and contemplated the dire consequences for humanity. So, I was particularly drawn to ASHA 'The Amazon Sacred Headwaters Alliance', which is transitioning the Amazon from an 'extractive economy', with all the logging of timber, the mining, the extraction of oil, to a 'regenerative bioeconomy'.

Since its inception in 2017, ASHA now has 28 member organisations, most of which are indigenous groups from Ecuador and Peru. Their vision includes pathways to improve livelihoods, safeguard collective land rights, and strengthen indigenous territorial governance.

Let us reflect on the wisdom of these indigenous people, who have always seen themselves as defenders and guardians of the natural ecosystem. Many of these people have spiritual connections with their waterfalls, mountains, trees and rivers, and feel they are united with them, as they live their lives in harmony with the natural world. They see the intruders into their land as having no understanding or awareness of their spiritual connectedness, and have no respect for Mother Earth.

ASHA has two prongs. One is a nature-based economy as it works with these guardians of the rainforest, who have already reforested 160,000 plants across ten communities. They continue to offer programmes on territorial monitoring and governance, food security, sustainable livelihoods, inter-cultural health and education, and renewable energy. The second is 'EVA, the Living School of the Amazon, which aims to equip the next generation with the knowledge and leadership skills necessary to tackle the region's challenges. Graduates receive certification in governance, human rights, and ancestral knowledge. Some of the first 30 graduates are already serving in positions of leadership at both local and regional levels. There are more than 40 new scholarship students currently enrolled in this year's programme.

The funding from the Earthshot prize will help projects such as this to 'transform the world for good", as they are full of possibility, hope and optimism As one of the indigenous leaders has said 'Unity is the only hope for our world'.

May our gift for the world this Christmas be to live in unity with 'all God's creation'.

Recycling at Harnham Parish Hall Update

Thank you to everyone who has recycled for Medic to Medic (M2M) at Harnham Parish Hall over the past year. The amount of material recycled continues to increase which is great news for both M2M raising funds to support students training to be Health Care Professionals in Malawi and for the Planet reducing the amount of landfill.

If you have been using the facility lately you will have noticed several changes. This is due to changes to the terracycling that companies will accept from M2M. There are several items we can no longer accept; these include Pens, and other writing implements and Plastic coffee packaging apart from Individual Cup Sachets. Pens are accepted at Rymans in Salisbury so please continue to collect and recycle there.

To replace those items, we now accept old cables and plugs, Marigold and disposable gloves and Kinder packaging. A full list of accepted items can be found below.

Please only recycle those items on the list below. Please note we cannot take Toothpaste tubes (accepted by Boots Salisbury and you can earn points in return) Crisp, Popcorn, Pretzel or Nut packets, Vegetable/Pet Food plastic bags, (which can be recycled at larger supermarkets), Confectionary wrappers or Deodorants.

Items that can be Recycled at Harnham Parish Hall

Bread plastic bags, Warburton wax bags and all bread product packaging. (crumb free and left flat)

Dental Products - any toothbrushes/heads, interdental sticks/brushes, empty floss containers

A BUMPER YEAR FOR FUN AND FUNDRAISING EVENTS!

Do think back over the past year, and celebrate the fun we've had in our local community while raising over £11,000 for Parish funds.

Isn't it great to have events and activities that draw people of all ages from across our community, and beyond, to build friendships, bring smiles to children's faces, spark new interests, provide entertainment, offer bargains and unexpected prizes – and raise funds!

Outstanding, as lively community events, have been the monthly First Wednesday Talks, organised with such care and imagination by Michael Turner, supported by the Social Committee and a stream of generous wine sponsors. The amazing array of local but so varied speakers has been greatly enjoyed by a very loyal group of people from across our community. Then in November a cast of 18 pooled their talents to present an unrehearsed but moving reading of Under Milk Wood by Dylan Thomas, followed by a spirited presentation of an amusing short play by Saki, The Baker's Dozen. The funds raised by the end of the year should reach a brilliant $\pounds4,500$.

Music was another popular focus, with a stimulating Organ Recital in All Saints in June, once again featuring the current Organ Scholar at the Cathedral, this year Benjamin Mills, and a varied concert of *a capella* music in July brought to us by Noteworthy, a talented group including our very own Revd Julian. All Saints Church also hosted a two week event in Salisbury's Art Trail, which showcased local artists and craftworkers, and encouraged people to drop in and see a 'living church' in action.

We were treated to two more Vicarage Quizzes, on Shrove Tuesday and at Harvest, masterminded by Neil Turpin as Quizmaster and Revd Becky as Caterer/Organiser, and in September, Richard and Julie Scott kindly opened up their beautiful garden for all to enjoy.

Much fun was had by all, in beautiful sunshine, at our annual 'We Love Harnham' Fun Day and Parish Fete, in July, which was again organised with generous support from Salisbury City Council and Wiltshire Council Housing. It was a great family day out, with the climbing wall and Dion and his children's disco as star attractions. The stalls, sideshows, refreshments and donations on the gate raised a brilliant \pounds 3,300 towards the fundraising total for the year.

The experimental Table Top Sale we held in September attracted a lot of interest from sellers, many of whom were pleased with what they made and want to come again! And we also managed to find homes for some of the books and bric-a-brac left over from the Fete!

Finally there was the Twilight Winter Fair on Saturday 2nd November in the Parish Hall, with crafts, art, refreshments, various stalls and musical entertainment by Maere Folk and the Salisbury Pluckers to warm the soul.

So a huge thank you to everyone who organised, baked, served, set up tables and chairs, or helped in other ways. You know who you are! But it is true to say that much of the organisation falls on a few shoulders, often people also directly involved in carrying other responsibilities within the churches – CAN YOU HELP SPREAD THE LOAD, AND HAVE FUN AT THE SAME TIME?

We need to put together a similar programme of events for 2025, book the Hall and make sure events are well spaced throughout the year, and offer something for everyone. This needs a small planning group to share ideas and plan a programme – COULD YOU BE PART OF THAT GROUP?

We need different organisers for particular events:

- Someone to organise a sequel programme to this year's First Wednesday Talks. We need someone to take the lead. COULD THIS BE YOUR THING?

EIGHTY YEARS IN CHURCH MUSIC - Part 2 a short reflection from Malcolm Sturgess (Continued from November magazine)

.....l can only assume that the words of *Hark, hark, my soul* reflected our own situation in late 1944.

We had had a difficult five years – bombed out four times, and my little friend Pamela killed by a bomb just over the fence at the bottom of our garden; I'd been to six schools in five years. Now, here at Brookwood, although it was still seven months to VE Day, there were no more sirens; no more of that terrifying whistling noise as a bomb fell nearby; no more bangs, gunfire or searchlights; no more doodlebugs. We could sleep at night and by day I could begin to learn how to live more like a normal little boy. Maybe the Vicar had his own reasons for feeling the same way, and chose this hymn frequently.

Ten years and two choirs later I learnt the hymn *Jesu meek and lowly*. I was still only a teenager, but I had begun to pay some attention to the readings and sermons, as distinct from going to church just for the music. At Holy Trinity we had a really good choir. We appeared on radio and TV. There were also about 300 communicants at Easter, and we sang a selection of hymns and anthems as they processed up in front of us. One of them was a lady who, in retrospect, I imagine must have had Parkinson's Disease. She only came at Easter. Supported by two others, she took about a six-inch step forwards, then rocked back three inches. Painfully slow progress. I couldn't sing any more; I choked up. There had to be something in this, something very powerful which caused that lady to make such a superb effort.

God certainly moves in a mysterious way. "Suffer little children to come unto me". In October 1944 my mother suffered me to join Walter Horswell's village choir. Eighty years later, I'm still here. To the end of my life I shall remain grateful for being able to complete 80 years in church music. I wish I could start again tomorrow. Deo Gracias.

lt was

1750 years ago, on 25 Dec 274 that the Roman Emperor Aurelian founded the cult of Sol Invictus as an official religion. He erected a temple and declared 25th December a national holiday, to be known as the Feast of the Unconquered Sun.

In 336, after the conversion of the Emperor Constantine, 25th December began to be celebrated by the church in Rome as the birthday of God's Son.

200 years ago, on 21st Dec 1824 that James Parkinson, British surgeon and politician, died. He was the first person to describe Parkinson's disease, in 1817.

125 years ago, on 5th Dec 1899 that Henry Tate, British sugar merchant and philanthropist, died. He established the Tate Gallery in London.

75 years ago, on 13th Dec 1949 that Jerusalem became the capital of Israel, replacing Tel Aviv.

60 years ago, on 31st Dec 1964 that Donald Campbell broke the world water speed record, and became the only person to break both the land speed record and the water speed record in the same year.

50 years ago, on 5th Dec 1974 that the last episode of the TV comedy series *Monty Python's Flying Circus* was broadcast in the UK.

also 50 years ago, on 24th Dec 1974 that British politician John Stonehouse was arrested in Australia (on suspicion of being Lord Lucan.)

40 years ago, on 19th Dec 1984 that the Sino-British Joint Declaration was signed by Britain and China. Britain agreed to return Hong Kong to Chinese sovereignty on 1st July 1997.

also 40 years ago, on 31st Dec 1984 that the Bank of England stopped producing one pound notes. They remained legal tender until 1988.

30 years ago, on 9th Dec 1994 that Sinn Fein held its first formal talks with the British government. This eventually led to the IRA ceasefire, the Good Friday Agreement, and the establishment of the Northern Ireland Assembly in 1998.

25 years ago, on 1st Dec 1999 that an international team of scientists working for the Human Genome Project announced that they had mapped an entire human chromosome (number 22). In April 2003 they announced that they had mapped all human chromosomes.

also 25 years ago, on 2nd Dec 1999 that the UK devolved political power in Northern Ireland to the Northern Ireland Assembly and Executive Committee.

also 25 years ago, on 31st Dec 1999 that the London Eye – the world's tallest Ferris wheel at the time, was officially opened on the banks of the River Thames. It opened to passengers in March 2000.

20 years ago, on 26th Dec 2004 that the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami (also called the Boxing Day Tsunami) took place. A massive undersea earthquake near Sumatra caused a devastating tsunami that swamped coastal areas in Indonesia, Sri Lanka, India, Thailand and East Africa. It was one of the deadliest natural disasters in recorded history, killing more than 230,000 people in 14 countries.

What's the Big Idea? -An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament

John

'John's Gospel is like a pool in which a child may wade and an elephant can swim. It is for the beginner in the faith and for the mature Christian.' (Leon Morris).

The Apostle John is usually credited with the authorship of this Gospel, writing in Ephesus at the end of the First Century. His purpose is *'that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.'* (20:31). Throughout he stresses the deity of Christ and presents Jesus as the Son of God.

In the prologue (1:1-14) Jesus is presented as the pre-existent and incarnate Word of God revealed by the Father. It also highlights how He has come as light into the world, so that those who believe in Him will not remain in darkness (cf 12:46).


The heart of John's narrative contains seven *signs* or miracles, which demonstrate who Jesus is and demonstrating His transforming power over creation and people: turning water into wine (2:1-11); healing the royal official's son (4:46-54); healing the paralytic (5:1-18); feeding the 5000 (6:1-14); walking on the water (6:16-21); healing of the man born blind (9:1-41) and raising Lazarus (11:1-44).


After these signs, the story moves into the upper room discourses followed by the story of His death and resurrection. The whole Gospel is a revelation of the glory of God's only Son, who comes to reveal the Father and then returns in glory to the Father. It can be well summed up in the famous verse: *For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.* (John 3:16).

Working for justice. The Makin Review and Archbishop Justin's resignation

Bishop Stephen, alongside Bishop Andrew and Bishop Karen, has responded to the review and the resignation of Archbishop Justin. He said: "I, together with Bishop Karen and Bishop Andrew, respect the decision of Archbishop Justin to step aside from his role as Archbishop of Canterbury and will continue to pray for him and his family. Archbishop Justin has taken personal and institutional responsibility to enable deeper change."

"The Makin review has exposed horrific abuse and misuse of power over many years. Questions out of this report must be addressed by the Church in a trauma-informed way, which places victims and survivors at the centre of it. In recent days the focus of debate has moved away from this, so I would ask us to refocus our attention back to the experience of victims and survivors and the lessons we must learn from doing so. In this Diocese we will continue to work to implement good safeguarding practices, supported by clergy and volunteers in our parishes, advised by our professional safeguarding team. We remain committed to engaging with victims and survivors of abuse."


