More than ever, we are aware of **cultural change** in politics, inflation, global trade and continuing conflicts, increased secularisation, the national churches' reputation at an all time low due to historic safeguarding mistakes, and yet also a search for spirituality from younger generations. We are also aware of the continuing decline in our worshipping community. So, what gives us peace and confidence?

We are all called and sent. Called by and into the life of Jesus Christ and the family of the Church. Why? To flourish, to love, to serve and to proclaim the good news of Christ's transforming love. So I wonder where you have seen new flourishing in your life, your church, your outreach in the community? In the past year

We have enabled people to flourish in all stages of life, at a local level, through such a wide range of worship, preachers and fundraising events; through missional outreach to families; in welcoming new newcomers to our worshipping communities as well saying some sad farewells.

We have continued to care deeply for our community and all who have stepped into our open churches. We have served our community, in hospital, in care homes, at home, through community teas, through governance, through the appointment process of a new headteacher, with a very positive SIAMS inspection at the Junior School; through pastoral care and community building. We have been pleased to welcome more baptisms and weddings.

We have focussed on essential financial changes. PCC members, wider members and our new treasurer have worked hard to ensure the parish has come out of deficit into surplus.

Thank you for being a caring, serving, prayerful committed community of Christians. Looking to the future

We must invest the gospel anew to each new generation. This will involve a deeper commitment to be confident in our faith, to reach the young, people in the new housing, and those who see no need for a wider community or God. We will need to unite more often in our worship so that we can be released into missional opportunities with families and/or develop services and activities that are not Sunday-centric. This will mean enabling the Field View room to be a community hub, changing our Church buildings, and finding what enables people to flourish in life and faith. It will mean continuing to spend wisely and invest in specific mission and projects.





Messy Church remains a vital part of our mission in Harnham. It is the most diverse congregation representing different ages, genders, social strata, and is supported by a core team of 4 and wider team of committed volunteers.

Messy Church has the highest number of young children between 6 months and 12 years attending any worship. All baptism families are invited along as part of their preparation.

Just a few comments from adults and children over the past 12 months:

'I cannot believe how many Dad's come along.'

'I love Messy Church.'

'My daughter really enjoyed this.'

A focus on the values of Messy Church as 'Jesus Centred' means we have explored who Jesus is, with the team reflecting together on various Bible passages and traditions before planning the activities.

Worship is invigorating- puppets, drama, the new Lion Storyteller Bible readings, songs and all age participation.

Fellowship matters through shared crafts, and mealtimes.

In 2024 Messy Church members have supported the Messy Church take over of Mothering Sunday and the annual Christingle Service-which is such a joy- lights, music band, procession and interactive learning. It will make your Advent! Do come along on the second Sunday of December..

Some of the Messy Church team also help to run children and family workshops each half term.


We all need fellowship and conversation about faith and the world so we can live well as Christians, reflecting more of the way of Christ...

Pause for Prosecco

Interesting! Fun! Thought provoking! Just a few comments from the group of women who meet every month for fellowship, a drink, laughter and a greater understanding of how to live as Christians grappling with many different issues that life and the world bring. Numbers have grown over the last year to 18! Newcomers to church or visitors come along as it's such a welcoming group with varied topics for discussion. How about these questions to consider: Who for you has been a good role model of service? Why? Why do you think people believe conspiracy theories? How do Christians reveal the truth? The Quakers' Book of Faith and Practice says, 'Attend to what love requires of you'. What does love require of you?

Pause for Thought met regularly throughout the last year at the Rose and Crown. Spring themes we considered were 'Questions Jesus asked' and every Wednesday in November we considered the theme 'Generosity'. Our conversations have been wide-ranging and allowed people to speak honestly in a shared and safe space. This sense of trust opens the door to a greater fellowship and a deeper awareness of one's personal faith.

Next new steps: Run 'Shape Course' and an exploring faith course.

.. a worldwide organisation whose aim is to make a difference, particularly to families, by Prayer, Fellowship and Action.

Prayer is central to all we do. **Fellowship** becomes more important as we grow older and less active, and under **action** we include sharing in the local projects of the MU as far as we are able.

We **fund raise** for the Mobile home holidays for families who need a break, for Salisbury Women's Refuge and for the work of MU members in poorer countries. We also supply our link branch in Malawi with fertiliser for the food they grow for the sick and child headed families.

We **organise** a tea four times a year for people on their own which we enjoy as much as they do! As individuals we help in the Toddler Group, Messy Church, Prayer Bears and with pastoral care.

Recently our programme includes "**Awareness**" Meetings to enable our members, and visitors too, to learn about the work of other outreach charities; The Missing Persons' Charity, Dentaid, Mercy Ships and the Salisbury/Sudan Medical Link.

Four new members joined our Branch last year which was a great joy. Sadly, three of our older members died making our membership 22 plus 3 not yet enrolled. No one needs to be a member to come to our meetings, all are welcome!

Next year the Mothers' Union will be 150 years old..... so watch this space!!

After-school club. During the school Autumn term, I assisted Revd. Becky in planning and running an after-school club for a small group of children at our local Junior School. To visit these patients and listen to their stories is a privilege and, I hope, provides a sense of holistic care and spiritual renewal during times of illness. The parish continues to work alongside NHS chaplains to offer this important pastoral support while people are in need of hospital care.

I serve the church visiting members of the community of Christians who for various reasons such as living dependently in nursing homes or at home having health and mobility problems and cannot attend church and/or need extra spiritual support. I try and make people feel that they are not forgotten that they are important value members of the church in Harnham. I ask if they have any requests to add to the prayers, and where possible I include people in choosing a bible passage and/or reading.

Up to 13 people have attended the monthly group for communion in Harnham Croft. Two of the monthly members requested a visit during the month in their room. Sometimes visiting family or friends may attend the group communion. Staff have also attended. I occasionally visit when a group is having a craft afternoon to get to know the residents and staff.

We are all called to serve God.

I feel that I did not choose but been directed to be an LPA by the Holy Spirit. It is very humbling and a privilege to help others to share their worries and hear their stories and just be still in silence. Prayer is an important part of being an LPA: to ask for guidance before visiting, prayers while I visit and to give my visit to the Lord after leaving.

What does it mean to serve the community through listening and prayer?

Listening I try to attend the Community Teas provided every few months by the Mothers Union for those on their own. Once again this provides the chance to listen to people and to build relationships with those outside our immediate church family. Once a month I act as one of the 'hosts' at the Harnham Community Network 'Coffee and Chat'. Serving coffee is a great opportunity to show care for members of our wider community, to listen to people's concerns and to build relationships. Run in partnership with Harnham Community Network, CINC these twice-weekly sessions offer a warm welcome to anyone to come along and enjoy a cup of coffee, a biscuit and a chat. Many guests are regular attendees, enjoying the opportunity to meet others. We continue to welcome new people, perhaps who are new to Harnham. I usually Known bake a cake to take along, which often prompts conversation! Judging by the noise level in the room at some sessions, there is plenty of chat going on!

Care for our community is also an important aspect of the prayers of intercession which are offered in our worship each week, when we pray not only for the wider Church and troubled areas of our world, but for our local community. Prayers are offered for those who live and work in Harnham and for our schools, as well as for activities which take place locally, ranging from our uniformed organisations to those who look after our local open spaces or participate in art and craft classes in our area.



This year has highlighted how safeguarding is EVERYONE's concern and responsibility. NO-ONE is too important not to take it seriously.

The Makin Report and the Jay Report have highlighted that the Church needs robust policies which support the victim/survivor and ensure that no-one is too important to be above reproach. Much was made in the national press of the General Synod's decision not to completely outsource Safeguarding to a completely independent institution. The Bishop of Salisbury and the Diocesan Safeguarding Team feel that the decision made was the correct one as a) no other organisation has a completely independent safeguarding team and b) they strongly feel that the Church must take responsibility for safeguarding and the actions of its members, rather than abdicating responsibility to an external team. Within the Diocese, the Diocesan Safeguarding Team have started offering monthly updates and have commissioned several extra training sessions to promote the 'trauma informed Pastoral care through approach' of managing safeguarding disclosures. They have also recruited extra staff to increase their capacity to deal with disclosures and support the parishes. Last year's

> For obvious reasons, safer recruitment processes, training and DBS checks are more important than ever. I am grateful for everyone's efforts in these areas. No screening system is completely fool proof, but it is an accepted fact that these processes will deter many with malevolent intentions. Safeguarding concerns are reported to Revd Becky or me on a regular basis and as a team we take the necessary actions, with guidance from the Diocesan Team.

> Locally, parishioners have been targeted by scammers; this appears to be a national problem as my mum's parish in Hertfordshire was reporting a near identical scam last week. Please do not buy any Amazon (or other) vouchers pertaining to be on behalf of Revd **Becky**. Likewise, we do not want a 'free' non-existent grand piano which is offered every few months!

> **Thank you** to those who have shared their concerns, which as a Parish we take seriously as part of our Christian care. On behalf of the PCC, I thank Jane Greenaway for her help, as she has now stepped back from the Deputy Safeguarding Officer role. I would also like to thank the PCC and especially Revd Becky for their help and support over the year. This role would be impossible without it.

A SWOT analysis of the Hall was prepared. A grand effort was made to make good various hall works and to renovate the Parish Office. Thank you to all involved in this over the Summer 2024.

The PCC discussed at length the purpose of the Parish hall, site plans, and the hub project. It was decided that an additional £400,000 investment would not represent good value for money or community benefit. The original planned extension will not now be built.

The heat pumps and flooring were investigated as they were not level. Outside lighting was changed.

The Site Enhancement group continued to explore improvements to the boundaries and car parking. It was agreed that the container should be removed as it is no longer needed.

A grant for Solar panels was followed up by Charles Woodd and Richard Scott.

New bookings for the hall included a Line Dancing group and NHS providers. The Hall booking system was investigated, and hiring prices were reviewed.

Archie Price continued as the hall cleaner. The five step NHS approach to the cleanliness of the hall was introduced and action taken over what was noticed.

Moving forward

- The meeting room, now named Field View, will be the focus of a community hub with good access, veranda and disabled toilet - the parish office could be moved to the storage room with renovations. Electrics will also need to be refitted.
- New main doors and internal doors will be fitted to the hall
- At present the PCC will retain sole responsibility for the hub

The First Wednesday Talks 19.30, on the first Wednesday of the month, germinated from an idea of Charles Woodd. It blossomed into the monthly feature in the church and community calendar.

Michael Turner led, with the principle drive to discover / uncover the gifts, talents and lives of Harnham residents and invite them to share them. There was a lot of curiosity, producing a bumper attendance at our first meeting 7 Feb. 2024 - Gary Price, the Cathedral's Clerk of Works, taking us well and truly behind the scenes of his working day.

The speakers took us into the realms of how to: write your first novel; remember your forebears and their exciting times; arrange flowers; watch birds; take photographs; ring bells and chaplain a school. We had a visit from Wiltshire Creative (one of whom lives in Harnham!) "Putting on the Pantomime." They were so overwhelmed by the warm welcome we gave that they turned their presentation into something to take to other community groups too. The November FWT fell almost halfway between Dylan Thomas's birth and tragically early death, so 'Under Milk Wood' and a play by Saki were performed by the newly founded Rambling Harnham Players. The producer, who had craftily acquired his favourite acting parts, cunningly managed to miss the opening night but they and the understudies gave a magnificent performance - who needs a producer anyway? A rousing 'History of Carols' ended our first year.

Apart from the enthusiasm and expertise of our speakers, to whom we most grateful, the most memorable feature of FWT is the real community atmosphere of each gathering. There was a buzz of excited communal chatter and friendship at the interval when we met new people and talked to our fellow Harnham residents we had never spoken to before - exactly what we had hoped to achieve.

A slightly abridged programme is happening in 2025, with record numbers at our opening meetings of the year. Come and enjoy a real community evening!

Huge thanks to Michael Turner, the social committee and Charles Woodd for their efforts in 2024.

We put the **fun** into **fun**draising! This was good community and faith building and played a key part in eradicating our deficit.

We now have a small surplus, hopefully continuing to improve in 2025.





Parish Giving Scheme ("PGS") is an established service for managing both one-off and direct debit giving, designed to support churches to fund their mission and ministry. MOVE to Parish Giving Scheme "PGS."

HOW?

Online load parish of Harnham on the PGS page "find a parish" and follow prompts for either regular giving or a one off donation. Ring PGS 0333 0021271, and complete direct debit instruction over the phone, having the bank account details and Harnham's PGS code of 340634440 ready.


Giving can be done:

- either by setting up an account, or as a guest.
- for regular donations or one off.
- anonymously if you wish, whether regular or one off. PGS only details and still processes the gift aid claim. No details are passed to the Parish.
- with minimal records kept and used for processing by the Parish **Other considerations** The volume of entries vary hugely- there are about 40 individual standing orders being paid into the PCC bank account every month on average. These:
- are half of the volume of entries on the PCC bank account, increasing work;
- have to be individually entered onto gift aid schedules and totalled for submission to the Revenue;
- for this reason, gift aid is only claimed every few months, requiring working capital funding of several thousand pounds.

In contrast PGS has two entries on the cash book monthly for the whole parish - total donations and tax recovered; and show no details of giving on the bank statement.



Deanery Synod

Report on Deanery Synod 2024

The Rural Dean post was vacant in January 2024. Bishop Andrew led a Deanery Synod in which each church shared their concerns and their hopes for the Deanery.

Revd Becky Roberts, Harnham was officially licenced as Rural Dean in May 2024. A standing committee was organised and agendas set for the year. Analysis of past meetings and improving future meeting by the standing committee included the need for purposeful meetings, the promotion of a culture of trust and inclusion and an update of the Deanery action plan; we analysed why attendance was below quoracy for previous meetings and decided to move Synod meetings around the Deanery. A paper was presented to the Diocesan secretary and registry concerning quoracy. Standing committee also stressed the need for the appointments of new secretary and lay chair and an invitation to guest speakers for good discussions and therefore action relating to the Diocesan vision.

It was noted that all parishes were paying their share, however one parish had not paid their full share in recent years. Diocesan communications concerning payment of past share termed as 'debt' and 'owing share' was part of the Diocesan narrative surrounding Diocesan deficit. The term debt has since been challenged at Diocesan Synod as all share is a voluntary contribution.

Two other Deanery Synod meetings took place in 2024 with the aim of reinvigorating Synod and good communication between parishes- one with the guest speaker Steve Inglis, the Diocesan Mission Coordinator. Neil Turpin was elected as lay chair of the Deanery Synod. Secretary to the Deanery Synod is vacant. The September meeting in St Michaels, Bemerton, had the focus of creating a culture of 'Being curious, Being present and Reimagining'.

Thank you to the team in Harnham who have enabled Revd Becky to visit worshipping communities within the seven parishes in Salisbury Deanery over the past year.

In January 2025 Craig Ryalls was licensed as assistant Rural Dean.
