



We have had a wonderful band of deliverers and “receivers” of Christian Aid envelopes again this year. A lot of money has been given electronically; but also, in the envelopes which came through doors we received £2225.60, three quarters of which was gift aided taking the total even higher.

At the moment the total raised throughout Salisbury is £12,500, again with most of it gift aided.

So an enormous thank you to everyone involved both from me but chiefly from all who rely on the work of Christian Aid worldwide to lift them out of poverty and despair.

Make of it what you will, but it is the only film I know of where music is absent.



Let's Tackle the Climate and Nature Crisis

As we prepare ourselves prayerfully to vote on 4th July, I hope we can all include our concerns for safeguarding creation and promoting biodiversity.

For the last two years there has been a group of MPs who have been promoting a private member's bill, now called the 'Climate and Nature' Bill, or the CAN Bill. The group has a wealth of information, along with a growing number of supporters, who include political leaders, private individuals, organisations, charities and businesses, all of whom are backing the bill and hope to see it become an Act of legislation in the next parliament.

The bill has been written by scientist, experts and campaigners who wish to

- Provide a clear, joined up plan which considers the climate crises- including nature and the climate warming globally.
- Reduce the UK's emissions in line with the Paris Agreement – ensuring our emissions are reduced quickly for the best chance to limit warming to 1.5 C.
- Halt and reverse the decline in nature- so nature can recover by 2030 as agreed at COP15.
- Ensure that the UK takes responsibility for our overseas footprint, (including goods we import from overseas) both our emissions and ecologically.
- Involve the public- so we all have a voice in finding a way forward through a 'climate and nature assembly'

No Mow May review

I do hope you can find time to walk around our two churchyards and discover some of the wildflowers which have emerged, many as a consequence of not mowing during the month of May.

Flowering in All Saints you will find: - Rockrose, Bird's-foot trefoil, Kidney vetch, Dropwort, Purples toadflax, Mouse-eared hawkweed, lots of Ox-eyed daisy, pyramidal orchid and one fragrant orchid, (this is rare and has a sweet scent).

On the patch where we had the huge bonfire to burn the hedge cuttings, there are at least three different types of speedwell, along with so much else for you to discover.

Soon you will find:- lots of Small scabious, Field scabious, plenty of lady's bedstraw, Evening primrose, (best to enjoy in the evenings), Wild parsnip and Wild carrot.

125 years of Gideons and Bibles

It was 125 years ago, on 1st July 1899, that Gideons International was founded. The evangelical Christian association places free Bibles in hotel rooms, hospitals, schools, military bases and prisons around the world.

It started when two traveling salesmen from Wisconsin in the northern USA – John Nicholson of Janesville and Samuel Hill of Beloit – met in a room at the Central House Hotel in Boscobel, Wisconsin, to talk about forming an association to strengthen the faith of people they came into contact with by distributing free Bibles “through designated traffic lanes of life”.

Most people encounter Gideon Bibles through their placement in hotel rooms, and research by Gideons International shows that about 25 per cent of travellers read a Bible when there is one in their room. The Gideons are exclusively Protestant evangelical businessmen with a belief in the Bible as the inspired Word of God and Jesus Christ as the Son of God.

In 2018 the UK section of Gideons separated from Gideons International over the issue of women's full membership, which is not allowed by the international organisation, but which received nearly 80 per cent support in a UK members' vote. After losing a dispute about the use of the name Gideons UK, they are now known as Good News for Everyone! They have links with Gideons in Canada and Sweden who have made similar decisions.

A very small number of men in the UK still belong to Gideons International. They are known as The Gideons International in the UK, and still remain a men's ministry.

What is a Rural Dean?

Some of you have been asking this question
so here is a simple explanation!

Any organisation has governance structures! Salisbury Diocese is just one of the Church of England's 42 Dioceses. Each Diocese has a structure of boards and councils responsible for different aspects of the Church's work including ministry, mission and education and is divided into Deaneries.

There are 21 Deaneries in Salisbury Diocese.

Salisbury Deanery includes the Parishes of Bemerton (St Michael's, Bemerton Heath, St John's Place and St Andrew's, Lower Bemerton); Fisherton Anger (St Paul's); St Thomas and St Edmund's (St Thomas's,); St Francis and Stratford sub Castle (St Francis's, St Lawrence's and Hope Church at Old Sarum) St Mark's and Laverstock, (St Mark's, St Andrew's, Laverstock and Bishopdown); Harnham (St George's, All Saints' and Messy Church) and St Martin (St Martin's). The Cathedral (St Mary's) is also present in the Deanery.

Decisions are made concerning ministry and mission at a number of levels: General Synod, a national structure, which has a house of Bishops and a house of Laity; Diocesan Synod, which has 4 clergy and 3 members of laity elected from each Deanery; Deanery Synod which has representatives from each parish who are elected by members of the electoral roll, all licenced clergy; and local governance in the form of the Parochial Church Council.

In Salisbury Diocese each parish nominates between 2 and 4 people onto Deanery Synod depending on the size of their electoral roll. Harnham has 3 representatives. Deanery Synod meets 3 to 4 times a year to discuss matters that feed into Diocesan Synod, as requested by the Synod or other points of discussion raised by the Bishop. Synod also meets to support and learn from each other and to organise and implement a Deanery Mission Plan.

A Rural Dean has different aspects to their role


- 1) to be alongside, support and encourage Deanery colleagues- people of faith who are called the laity and those who are 'active' and retired ordained ministers. **A Rural Dean** has a key role in nurturing, encouraging and equipping people in their faith journeys of discovery and developing ways to celebrate the Christian journey of the whole people of God. Rural Deans aim to aid personal growth through education and learning, while maintaining the necessary sense of humour and commitment to prayer and worship!
- 2) to maintain the Deanery Chapter – the meeting of ministers –as a place of fellowship, mutual love and respect. Developing a collegial atmosphere among members of the Chapter releases chrism's (gifts) and can lead parishes to share worship and mission opportunities. When Chapter is a place of support and encouragement, theological difference can become creative and supportive.

3) Work alongside a lay colleague and the Deanery Pastoral and Standing Committee, to set the agenda and offer focus and direction for Deanery Synod. Within Synod, Deanery Strategic Planning, Deanery Deployment Planning and Mission Action Planning are developed.

How are Rural Dean's chosen? They are nominated by the Bishop after consultation with Deanery clergy and normally serve – as “first among equals”. The Rural Deans in the Diocese of Salisbury share with the bishops in a ministry of oversight and are consulted regularly as part of an extended senior staff team.

As with any role with different aspects, the key is getting a balance between work with the local worshipping community in the Parish, leadership in the wider community and the duties of being a Rural Dean.

I hope to enjoy the privilege of holding these strands in one ministry and making the most of all the opportunities that the role provides. Thank you all for your support in this venture.

Ticket Fraud

New data released by Action Fraud reveals £6.7 million was lost to ticket fraud last year. <https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/ticketfraud>

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a ticket fraud awareness campaign, warning people to be alert to fraudsters trying to catch out people planning for popular and sold-out events. Last year more than 8,700 people reported they had been a victim ticket fraud, with a total of £6.7 million lost. This works out to an average loss of £772 per victim.

How to protect yourself from ticket fraud:

- Only buy tickets from the venue's box office, the promoter, an official agent or a well-known and reputable ticket exchange site.
- Avoid paying for tickets by bank transfer, especially if buying from someone unknown. Credit card or payment services such as PayPal give you a better chance of recovering the money if you become a victim of fraud.
- The password you use for your email account, as well as any other accounts you use to purchase tickets, should be different from all your other passwords. Use three random words to create a strong and memorable password, and enable 2-step verification (2SV).
- Be wary of unsolicited emails, texts or adverts offering unbelievably good deals on tickets.
- Is the vendor a member of Society of Ticket Agents and Retailers (STAR)? If they are, the company has signed up to their strict governing standards. STAR also offers an approved Alternative Dispute Resolution service to help customers with outstanding complaints.



All in the month of July

It was:

125 years ago, on 1st July 1899 that the Gideons International was founded. The evangelical Christian association places free Bibles in hotel rooms, hospitals, schools, military bases and prisons around the world.

100 years ago, on 11th July 1924 that British sprinter Eric Liddell won the men's 400 metres gold medal at the 1924 Olympics in Paris. He preferred the 100 metres, but the heats were held on a Sunday, and he refused to run in them.

90 years ago, on 4th July 1934 that Marie Curie, Polish-born French physicist died. Twice winner of the Nobel Prize for her work on radioactivity. The first woman to win a Nobel prize.

75 years ago, on 27th July 1949 that the first successful test flight of the de Havilland Comet, the first commercial passenger jet, took place. The jet went on into production.

Also 75 years ago, on 29th July 1949 that the BBC began broadcasting regular weather forecasts on TV.

70 years ago, on 5th July 1954 that the BBC launched the first daily television news programme in the UK.

Also 70 years ago, on 21st July 1954 that the first part of J R R Tolkien's epic fantasy novel *The Lord of the Rings* was published.

65 years ago, on 25th July 1959 that the first hovercraft crossed the English Channel. The SRN-1 had been designed by British inventor Christopher Cockerell.

60 years ago, on 28th July 1964 that NASA launched its Ranger 7 space probe on a mission to the Moon. On 31st July it sent back the first close-up images of the lunar surface.

50 years ago, on 24th July 1974 that the US Supreme Court ordered President Richard Nixon to surrender the White House tape recordings that had been subpoenaed by the House Judiciary Committee in April. The White House released the tapes on 5th August, and Nixon resigned on 9th August, before he could be impeached.

40 years ago, on 9th July 1984 that York Minster in England was struck by lightning, which set fire to the roof and destroyed the south transept.

30 years ago, on 15 July 1994, that the Rwandan genocide ended. Up to 1.1 million people were killed by the Hutu-led government and other militias between April and July.

Also 30 years ago, on 21st July 1994 that Tony Blair was elected leader of Britain's Labour Party. He became Prime Minister in 1997.

25 years ago, on 1st July 1999 that the Scottish Parliament was officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II.

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament'

1 & 2 Samuel

1 & 2 Samuel was originally a single work, which focuses on Samuel, Saul and David, around 1,000 BC, mid-way between Abraham and Jesus. It was Samuel who established the monarchy in Israel after the period of the judges. He was commanded by God to give the people a king, although their request is seen as a rejection of God's rule over Israel (8:7). The people simply wanted to be like other nations, however their king was still subject to God's law and the word of the prophet. Although Samuel anointed Saul, he soon showed an unwillingness to submit to these requirements, leading to his rejection as king (15:23). God chose David as Saul's successor, and 1 Samuel depicts David's years of waiting until the right time arrived to claim the throne.

2 Samuel depicts David's rule, in which the nation prospers and its enemies are defeated. The promise of the perfect king is fulfilled in Jesus Himself, as David's descendant. The second half of the book depicts the darker side of David's reign, describing his weaknesses and failures, including his adultery with Bathsheba and the rebellion of his son Absalom.

Nevertheless, David remained a man after God's own heart: '*The LORD does not look at the things man looks at. Man looks at the outward appearance, but the LORD looks at the heart.*' (1 Samuel 16:7).

The characters in this book are not always great examples of faith, however, '*They do not show us how we should live but how in fact we do live, authenticating the reality of our daily experience as the stuff that God uses to work his purposes of salvation in us and in the world.*' (Eugene Peterson).




