Dear friends,

I don't often reach the top deck of a bus anymore. Maybe I am scared the driver will pull away while I'm ascending the stairs and I will be sent tumbling back down them again! But when I do, the perspective of my world changes, a gift that many high places offer. I can peer over walls into the gardens of neighbours, admire, with a wry smile, the bald patches of pedestrians and look down on gratuitous SUV's which, at any other time, would tower over me at traffic lights. Here on the top deck the world is different, but also seen more clearly; the hidden is revealed, the true scale of things more apparent.

The clutter of the world is below me now, it no longer fusses with its demands and irritations. Mediocrity is no longer a challenge as, perched on my high seat, I can see it for what it is and glide over it, with only the branches of trees and a clearer view of the sky as company.

But suddenly a jolting realisation, aided by the driver as he slams on the brakes, nearly forgetting that red lights really do mean stop. I am again refocused, realising that the world downstairs cannot be extinguished by my elevation. Nor should it be allowed to as it is my home, my ascension is only a schooling meant to guide my real journey back on the lower deck.

This reminds me of an image. It is from the (unintentionally) comical painting by Adriaen van Overbeke, which depicts the ascension of Jesus. It shows his disciples left alone as they stare up at his feet as he disappears into a cloud.

The journey of these disciples in the world will be the future, however, a fact emphasised by the angels in Acts chapter 1 who ask the 'men of Galilee' why they are standing around staring at the sky after Jesus disappears into it. Instead, they imply, there is work to be done here on earth.

So, even though an elevated perspective is an education, transcendent and wise like all truths are, our business still remains within the world. An ascension points to where we can receive this wisdom, as did the final events of Jesus's presence with us. It is a witness for our ministry ahead.

As I descend the steps to the lower deck of the bus, I express my gratitude to the driver that I survived his driving, then step from the doors into the mass and chaos of the street with a new perspective offered by my brief ascension.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The Harnham Parish APCM will take place in the Harnham Parish Hall on 25th May It will follow a United Service of Holy Communion at 10am.

The Parish Electoral Roll begins from scratch this year - all application forms were to be returned by May 1st. A person who is 16 or over may be on the electoral roll if they are baptised, is a member of the Church of England or a church in communion with the Church of England, and have either lived in the parish for at least 6 months, or if non resident have attended worship for 6 months.

The APCM at 11am will include elections of churchwardens and Parochial Church Council members and a review of the year, including the year end accounts. Copies of the annual review and accounts will be in both churches from 17th May

The Restoration of Windsor Castle after the 1992 fire - The Inside View

April 2nd brought the second First Wednesday Talk of the year where Harnham resident Chris Watson told us all about one of the events of Queen Elizabeth II's annus horribilis that led to four years of his own sleepless nights.

The 20th November 1992 saw the destruction, by fire, of some key areas of the world's largest and most continuously occupied palaces, Windsor Castle.

Chris described how the fire started and spread through the historic fabric that was mid refurbishment; this was fortuitous as areas of the building, finishes, furniture and exquisite art collection were in storage or protected which ultimately led to them escaping the full impact of the fire.

115 rooms, including nine staterooms, were destroyed in the fire which burned for 15 hours. 4,000 gallons of water (the equivalent of 2 minutes falling over Niagara Falls) were required to quench it; it was advised that it would take ten years to dry out!

The restoration, project managed by Chris, was astonishingly completed in five years from the day of the blaze at a cost of £36.4 million pounds - below the £40 million budget.

Whilst many rooms faithfully recreated more creative licence was agreed in others. To this end St George's Hall was "improved" from the Wyatville design and the fabulous Lantern Room was created. Several gems were discovered during the restoration, such as the mediaeval ceiling to the kitchen and original frescoes in St George's Hall.

4,000 people covering 240 packages of work were involved in the restoration, 28 miles of scaffolding were required, three wheelbarrows of gold leaf were used, 3500 contract instructions were issued with everyone doing their very best work on such a prestigious building.

The original designer of large parts of Windsor Castle in the 1820s, Jeffry Wyatville, has links to the Salisbury area having worked on projects at Phillips House in Dinton, Longleat House, Roche Court and Wilton House. Whilst on the subject of Wilton, we were all rather thrilled to hear that a 52ft x 23ft extra superfine Axminster carpet commissioned by Prince Albert in 1851 survived the blaze as it was under protective plywood from the initial works.



Our planned meeting for the month of May is the ever popular 'Soup and Sweets' Lunch on FRIDAY 23rd where all the donations will go towards the work of the Mothers' Union overseas.

So how will that money be spent?

The ongoing conflicts in Russia and Ukraine and Israel and Gaza make the news headlines almost every day. However, recently the plight of the peoples of Sudan has come to the attention of the media once more following a high-level international conference hosted by Britain's Foreign Secretary, David Lammy.

Sudan's civil war began two years ago and has been called the world's worst humanitarian crisis. Some 30 million people are in desperate need and people are starving as a result of the war.

In Darfur women and children have been particularly impacted with over three million women and girls at risk of gender-based violence and the majority of children lacking access to formal education.

Throughout the two years of conflict the Mothers' Union has remained a beacon of hope particularly in the Diocese of Port Sudan and El Obeid. Port Sudan has become a home for tens of thousands of displaced people, mostly women and children. MU workers visit regularly, leading prayers and, when resources permit, they distribute essential supplies among the women in the camps. They also organise training workshops for the women. In the Diocese of El Obeid despite being in the RSF controlled region and surrounded by conflict Mothers' Union maintains its vital work ensuring the continuation of literacy circles that not only build essential skills but provides emotional support and solidarity. Your donations will help to enable this valuable work to continue.

Christian Aid Week 11-17 May Focus on Guatemala

This year's Christian Aid Week story takes us to Guatemala, a country dealing with the challenge of the climate crisis which is causing erratic weather, leading to crop failures and poverty. Farmers like Aurelia below are helping their communities overcome these challenges. Guatemala faces severe agricultural and developmental issues, with indigenous communities in Alta Verapaz particularly affected by droughts, storms, and industrial plantations. Over half the population works in agriculture, yet it remains a hunger hotspot with children suffering from malnutrition. Guatemala is one of the 10 countries in the world rated most vulnerable to climate emergencies, where fear and uncertainty loom.



Aurelia Holding Hope in Her Hands

Aurelia, an inspiring Q'eqchi' farmer in the Alta Verapaz region, faces climate challenges that threaten her crops and food security. Despite the extreme weather, she sought solutions through agricultural training provided by a local co-operative/NGO body Congcoop, in turn supported by Christian Aid. Learning to grow climate-resilient crops, produce fertilizer, and build rainwater systems, she now combats the climate crisis while securing her family's food. Aurelia also shares her knowledge with her community, showcasing remarkable resilience and leadership. It is crucial that Congcoop can continue with its support so that more farmers can adapt and thrive amidst changing climate conditions, and this is where our donations can help.

Not many university students are able to write Christian songs which become worldwide hits, but Don Emry Fishel managed it with his Alleluia No. 1. Nearly 50 years on, it is loved and sung by millions of Christians worldwide.

Fishel wrote it in 1971, while he was a student at the University of Michigan and also music leader of a Roman Catholic charismatic community based in Ann Arbor, Michigan. These were the days of folk songs and guitars, and Alleluia No. 1 fitted the prevailing mood perfectly. Written in E Major, it is ideal for guitar accompaniment.

Mr Fishel became a freelance flutist, flute instructor and composer. He was Publications Editor for The Word of God and Servant Music for a number of years and then worked in computers for 25 years. In 2008 he moved to Nashville and returned to music, teaching the flute.

Alleluia No 1 was Fishel's first song, written "rather quickly, in about an hour." It had four verses to begin with, but a fifth verse (which became the third verse) was added later, as he prepared for baptism. As Fishel explained, he wanted the line 'We have been crucified with Christ; now we shall live forever' "to be the centre of the song."

Alleluia No. 1 was first published in the UK in Sound of Living Waters, in 1974.

Remembering VE Day – 80 years on

80 years ago, on 8th May 1945, VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of World War 2. It was celebrated as a public holiday, and came exactly a week after German radio announced the death in action of Adolf Hitler.

In reality, Hitler had committed suicide on 30th April. His successor, Grand Admiral Karl Dönitz, quickly negotiated an end to the war with the Allies – at the same time trying with some success to prevent as many Germans as possible from falling into Soviet hands.

Field Marshal Montgomery accepted the unconditional surrender of German forces in the Netherlands, north-west Germany and Denmark at a ceremony near Hamburg on 4th May. All German forces then surrendered to Supreme Allied Commander General Eisenhower on 7th May at Reims, France. Soviet leader Josef Stalin had his own ceremony, in Berlin.

The announcement that the war had ended in Europe was broadcast to the British people by the BBC late on 7th May. It was decreed that there would be a national holiday the next day, and the stage was set for huge celebrations. Prime Minister Churchill had been assured that there was enough beer in the capital, and commemorative items, including VE Day mugs, were quickly produced.

St Paul's Cathedral held ten consecutive services giving thanks for peace, each one attended by thousands of people, and churches throughout the country rang their bells. The Royal Family played a central role, appearing eight times on the balcony of Buckingham Palace while huge numbers of people flocked down The Mall.

In the United States, VE Day coincided with President Harry S Truman's 61st birthday. He dedicated the victory to the memory of his predecessor, Franklin D Roosevelt, who had died of a stroke less than a month earlier. But both Truman and Churchill pointed out that the war against Japan had not yet been won. That final victory was still more than three months away.

Of course, the end of a war could never be neat. In Europe the last known shots on the Eastern Front were actually fired on 11th May, and on 25th May the battle of Odžak ended in a Yugoslav Partisan victory. Tragically, in French Algeria, Muslims celebrating the end of the war (some also peacefully protesting for independence) were “inexcusably” massacred by colonial authorities and militias – leading eventually to the Algerian War nine years later.

What's the Big Idea? -

An Introduction to the Books of the Old Testament

Ecclesiastes

*'Meaningless! Meaningless!' This is how the book of Ecclesiastes begins (1:2), as it examines the futility of human experience '*under the sun*'. The author is named as '*The Teacher*' (1:1, Hebrew *qoheleth*), traditionally identified with King Solomon. Although focusing on life in the physical world, the book ends with, '*Fear God and keep his commandments*' (12:13).*

Ecclesiastes reminds us of the limitation of human wisdom, which cannot find meaning and purpose without God:

Our strivings '*under the sun*' can only lead to disillusionment (1:5–11). Therefore, we need to accept the life God gives us and enjoy it to the full.

Wisdom is given to those who please God (2:26). Such wisdom cannot solve all problems (1:16–18), or secure enduring reward (2:12–17). We cannot control our immediate future, resulting in uncertainty (6:12), and there are difficult questions about life and death itself (9:1–3). In response, we need to understand our human limitations before God.

God has ordered all things in their time; things we cannot change or fully anticipate: '*There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven*' (3:1–15).

However, the world is not fundamentally chaotic or irrational, as it is ordered by God: '*He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end.*' (3:11). We should remember our Creator when we are young before the infirmities of advanced age stop us from enjoying the good things of life (12: 1–8).

In summary, Ecclesiastes shows us how to live meaningfully and joyfully by placing God at the centre of our life, while trusting and obeying our Creator.



Word Search

This year is the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Athanasius is the theologian behind that creed, and his Feast Day falls on 2nd May.

Athanasius (296-373) was born into a prosperous family in Alexandria in Egypt, and entered the ministry. He was 29 years old when he accompanied Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, to the Church's first great ecumenical Council, at Nicaea in 325. There he saw the Council debate the Person of Christ. How was He the Son of God and also Man? Did He really exist before He was born? If we worship Him, does that mean that we are worshipping two Gods?

When the heresy of Arius, which taught that Christ was not divine and not eternal, later threatened the church, Athanasius worked with his bishop, Alexander, in framing what became known as the Nicene Creed. Our Lord's full divinity was safeguarded in the words, 'eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one substance with the Father.'

For the next 45 years Athanasius' devotion, scholarship, and forceful leadership established the Nicene Creed in the Christian Church. His enemies, both in Church and state, conspired against him, and he was exiled five times from the See of Alexandria and spent a total of 17 years in flight and hiding.

Athanasius' name will always be linked with the triumph of New Testament Christology over every form of reductionism (lessening of the Person of Christ.)

All in the month of May

It was

150 years ago, on 1st May 1875 that Alexandra Palace in London was officially opened. It became the home of BBC television in 1935.

125 years ago, on 17th May 1900 that, during the Second Boer War, the 217-day Siege of Mafeking was relieved by 2000 British forces and South African volunteers. Colonel Robert Baden-Powell, who led the forces defending Mafeking during the siege, became a national hero, and later founded the Scouting movement.

90 years ago, on 19th May 1935 that T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) died in a motorcycle accident, aged 46.

Also 90 years ago, on 25th May 1935 that Sir Frank Watson Dyson, British Astronomer Royal (1910-33) died. He introduced the Greenwich time signal (the 'pips') and also, helped to prove Einstein's theory of general relativity.

80 years ago, on 1st May 1945 that German radio announced the death of Adolf Hitler. It was reported he had died a hero's death fighting, but in fact he had committed suicide.

Also 80 years ago, on 8th May 1945 that VE Day took place – marking Victory in Europe at the end of WW2. It was celebrated as a public holiday.

75 years ago, on 13th May 1950 that the first Formula One World Championship race was held, at Silverstone. (Also known as the 1950 British Grand Prix.)

50 years ago, on 27th May 1975 that Dibble's Bridge Coach Crash in Hebden, North Yorkshire took place. 32 people were killed and 13 injured when a coach's brakes failed on a steep hill. It remains the worst road accident in the UK, by fatalities.

40 years ago, on 29th May 1985 that the Heysel Stadium Disaster took place in Brussels. 39 football fans were crushed to death during rioting at the European Cup Final between Liverpool and Juventus.

30 years ago, on 1st May 1995 that the World Health Organisation (WHO) published its first annual survey of global health.

25 years ago, on 4th May 2000 that Ken Livingstone became the first Mayor of London.

Also 25 years ago, on 7th May 2000 that Vladimir Putin was inaugurated as President of Russia.

15 years ago, on 6th May 2010 that the British General Election resulted in a hung parliament. A coalition government was formed on 11th May by the Conservative Party leader, David Cameron, and the Liberal Democrat party leader, Nick Clegg.






