“...trust us, you look amazing...”

Dear friends,

For 10 days last month our headlines were lifted from their litany of trauma to instead report an ascendant feat of humanity.

As the Artemis II mission rocketed from our world and into the heavens to orbit the moon, we were released momentarily from the shackles of our divisions to realise the transcendent.

Breaking free from Earth orbit, approaching 100,000 miles from their home, the four astronauts had a chance to look back and see our planet in its entirety, causing them to pause and for one of them to affirm;

“...trust us, you look amazing, you look beautiful...” [1]

How we needed to hear this. In saner times, this observation may have slipped into the saccharine, but not today.

Such is the pitiful trajectory of our world, these words were a lifejacket, lifting us above the spiteful deluge flooding the globe and revealing a perspective from the heavens.

Samantha Harvey's Booker prize winning novel, *Orbital*, notes a similar revelation [2]. Her characters, astronauts on the International Space Station, view the earth from orbit and see a heaven, whereas on earth in contrast, we look up to space when we seek this paradise.

This echoes a truth instilled in Scripture in how God sees us and we see him. That even though we may look 'up' to see God, he also looks 'down' and sees us in love.

This month, while recalling the ascension of Christ, we will clamber up hills to ascend as we traditionally believe God has done. Yet, in that moment when we stand above, we can also look down and I hope, as our spacefaring explorers have already realised, see beauty, realise value and feel affection, as does God without limit.

If we are ever to free ourselves from the bitter news of our crisis on Earth, we need to realise that in us all there is this value. That we are all as we are viewed from the heavens, precious and created in love.

‘Thy Kingdom Come’ Global prayer movement marks ten years

This year the global prayer movement *Thy Kingdom Come* (TKC) will take place from Thursday 14 to Sunday 24 May.

Spanning the 11 days between Ascension and Pentecost, the initiative encourages Christians to pray for five people whom they know (friends, families, neighbours) to come to faith.

This year is a special one for *Thy Kingdom Come*. It was ten years ago, in 2016, that it began as a call to prayer from the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Archbishop of York.

TKC has since grown into a global wave of prayer, involving tens of millions of Christians, in dozens of denominations, in almost 90% countries worldwide.

To mark these first ten years, the new archbishop, Sarah Mullally, has written a Novena for the initiative.

This year’s theme is ‘God With Us’. With the help of leaders from across the church traditions, TKC will explore a different Bible story each day, one which demonstrates God’s transformative presence, power and love at work in the lives of people and communities.

At 11.15 for approximately 45 minutes. During the meeting there will be a brief overview of the past year, the accounts, and the election of Churchwardens, PCC and Deanery Synod Members.

Your Parochial Church council. Your help. We need:

- People who enjoy governance, with an overview of the mission of the parish.

We hold six two hour meetings of the Parochial Church Council per year. In the past year we have considered how the churches fulfil their mission to proclaim good news, share and nurture faith, serve others, challenge injustice, and tend creation in the way we use our buildings, and our activities in church and in the community. We have also made vital decisions about the use of finance. Before each meeting reading time is needed for the documentation. The PCC are trustees of the parish. This is a volunteer role and this year there will be six spaces. (Spaces are allocated according to the number of people on the electoral roll.)

- Two Churchwardens - St George's and All Saints. Churchwardens with a focus on governance. People who can delegate roles. The role includes preparing, with others, the standing agenda for PCC. Liaising with the new Parish Coordinator on rotas, ensuring that nothing from the churches that is moveable goes missing! Volunteers. Could you volunteer ?

Our sincere thanks to Jane Carr who has been churchwarden for two years, and Robert Salkeld who has been churchwarden (this time round!) for three years. Without them the churches would be less organised, progress on works to the churches would not have proceeded as far and rotas would not have been organised.

The churchwarden role can be split into different parts which is why we would like you to consider if you could be the person focussed on governance and delegation.

Why volunteer?

It is both fun and fundamental to the working of the Parish Churches, in order to promote faith and service in Harnham Community.

The Oxen Plough Challenge

As Christians and as MU members we are called to reflect God's love in prayer and action. It is with great joy and pride (at all it has accomplished) that the Mothers' Union Worldwide is celebrating 150 years since it was founded.

Our Harnham Branch is 131 years old, having been started by the late Jane Pelly's grandmother! As part of our celebrations, we have taken words from our prayer to heart "reaching out in love and service (Lord Jesus) as your hands across the world." and have linked up with a branch in Torit, South Sudan.

There the Mothers' Union decided to tackle exorbitant food prices with the resources they had, namely land and their woman power, in order to help others. On 3 May at the 10am service in St George's Church the Mother's Union will be leading a sermon slot to explain the new Project. The project aims to promote sustainable agriculture, and to buy drought resistant seeds and two oxen and a new plough, which costs about £1,200, so that people can be self sufficient in a changing climate. Do come along and listen.

All donations from The SOUP AND SWEETS LUNCH on Sunday 26 April in the Parish Hall at 12.30pm will be in aid of this much needed project. Do come and support us and so support this struggling community in South Sudan, as well as enjoying a variety of delicious home-made soups and sweets, and the company of friends old and new! We look forward to welcoming you!

Church Electoral Roll

What is the Church electoral roll?

Simply put, it is a list of people who consider themselves connected with or a part of Harnham Parish, perhaps by attending worship or living nearby. Every parish church in the Church of England has an electoral roll. The roll size contributes to decisions about the collection and distribution of resources (eg Parish share payable, Diocesan support to parish). The Church electoral roll is completely separate from the civic electoral roll, which allows you to vote in parliamentary and local elections.

Why should I join the Church electoral roll?

Join because it's an official recognition that you are connected with and a part of Harnham Parish and playing your part in the faith community. It gives you rights to vote for, nominate and stand for election as a member of our Parochial Church Council (PCC). PCC members are the Trustees of our churches and are responsible for the finances and church buildings. They work with the Rector or (in interregnum) wardens to deliver our vision "Living, Loving and Learning". Being on the electoral roll can be a supporting factor in relation to other rights, eg getting married or being buried here.

In Salisbury Diocese, if you are on the electoral roll, you have free access to the Cathedral.

Who can be on the Church electoral roll?

To join the Church electoral roll, you must be:

- 16 years or over by 31 May 2026. (If you are 15, you can complete a form and we will add you when you turn 16)
- Baptised into the Christian faith
- A lay person (not an ordained person)

You should also consider yourself to be a part of the Church of England and either live within the parish boundary or regularly attend worship here. If you attend another Anglican church, you can be on more than one electoral roll, as long as you meet the criteria above. If you attend churches of different denominations, you're welcome to be on our electoral roll if you consider yourself part of the Church of England.

What is expected of me if I am on the Church electoral roll?

There are no specific expectations. We invite everyone to take an active part in our life together through prayer, worship, events, volunteering and financial donations.

What happens to my information?

We will publish only your name on a printed copy in church. The parish administration and ministry team use the information to contact you and support you. We will not publish your address, email address or any other information you provide beyond this.

How do I join the Church electoral roll?

We encourage all those who are able to fill in the online form from the website www.harnhamparish.org.uk as this makes it easier administratively and maximises accuracy. Or speak to one of the churchwardens who can give you a paper copy.

ECO CHURCH

Go and ask the animals, or the birds in the sky, and they will tell you; or speak to the earth, and it will teach you, or let the fish in the sea inform you. Which of all these does not know in God's hand is the life of every creature and the breath of all humankind. Job 12 v 7-10

We all welcome the month of May, as it heralds in those glorious summer days. But I am concerned that we need so many environmental days to provoke us to act responsibly to safeguard the earth. If we listened, as indigenous peoples still do today, we would be so much wiser and know how to live in harmony with our environment.

Composting Week, 3-9 May. Composting or recycling our waste (see April's magazine) is seriously important. The environment gains by every banana peel, coffee grinds and grass clipping we compost, instead of throwing them away.

Water Saving Week, 4-10 May. All living organisms need water for their survival, and this year we are reminded how our everyday actions in our homes, churches etc, directly safeguard the natural habitats around us. Indonesian communities remind us 'to live in a sacred cosmos is to recognise that every part of creation is woven into a moral and spiritual web. When that web tears – through greed, violence or silence - the whole cosmos groans.'

Endangered Species Day, 15 May. For more than 50 years there has been an 'Endangered Species Act', but with global warming and human greed, species are still at risk of extinction. We have known of the declining numbers of polar bears and now their changing behaviours. High in the Andes an ancient forest is the last refuge for a tiny hummingbird on the edge of extinction, threatened by agricultural expansion.

World Bee Day, 20 May. We know of the challenges and declining numbers of our pollinators, and yet they are critical in our agrifood systems supporting the production of more than 75% of the worlds crops, such as fruits, vegetables, seeds, plus increasing crop yields. Let us welcome the scouts with their butterfly bank, also an attraction for bees.

International Day for Biodiversity, 22 May. When biodiversity has a problem, so has humanity. Despite all our technological advances we are completely dependent on healthy and vibrant ecosystems for our water, food, medicines, cloths, energy etc. On the island of Kalmantan, fires burn the land every year to clear it for palm oil and mining. These ancient forests are now stripped bare but were once the homes to orangutang and clouded leopards besides indigenous communities. The smoke haze spreads across neighbouring nations, their rivers are turned black with ash and oil. For these people, the forests are more than a resource, but a living relative. As the forests fall the damage is more than ecological, it is spiritual. And as the indigenous leaders resist, they face intimidation and/or exile and so become our refugees and/or asylum seekers.

May 10 – 16th is Christian Aid week which this year is focusing on the poverty of urban mothers in Nairobi who struggle daily to feed their children. If we, in the west learnt to listen to the earth, and were more aware of the global impact of our lifestyles, perhaps there would not be so many people living in poverty or having to flee their homes and lands to seek security elsewhere. An elder of Greenland once said ‘The ice is our library. Each crack, each creek tells us how the world is changing’

The Fascinating Story of Bread

On the first Wednesday in April, which happened to be April Fool’s Day and the Wednesday of Holy Week, an expectant audience gathered in Harnham Parish Hall for an evening about Bread, a food laden with significance of all kinds, as we heard through the evening. To begin with, Revd Michael Camp, this year’s First Wednesday Talks organiser, took us through a fascinating short history of bread over the ages. He explained that the first evidence archaeologists have found are breadcrumbs just 15,000 years old!

He pointed out that bread has very often been at the centre of hospitality and welcome, in many different cultures. He drew attention to the variety of grains used in making bread, so producing breads of very different colours and tastes. Bread, like many other things, has been subject to changing fashions over the ages. In the Middle Ages and beyond, white bread was the prestigious choice for the rich, while the poor had to make do with brown, or more recently in the war, grey bread. We seem to have come full circle since then!

Michael then introduced Alan Woodrow, who generously bakes a beautiful Harvest loaf for St George’s Church each year for our Harvest Festival. Alan talked about the process of breadmaking and the techniques he uses, and the satisfaction it gives. Other audience members then shared their breadmaking experience, and highlighted the opportunities it offers, even with a breadmaking machine(!), to produce many varieties of delicious bread. As a small illustration of this, Michael invited people, during the break for wine or juice, to sample pieces from a seeded loaf (admittedly from Waitrose) and Middle Eastern style flat bread.

In the second half, Michael focused on the religious and liturgical significance of bread, particularly for the Israelites in the Old Testament, where unleavened bread is a key component of the annual Passover meal, and for Christians who remember Christ’s death and resurrection every Sunday in bread and wine at the Eucharist.

Throughout the evening we were treated to a series of poems on the theme of bread, read eloquently for us by Pat Davidson and Joanna Woodd. They matched the whole evening’s careful balance between the amusing and the serious.

Living at Willowcroft

I am writing to you in this magazine as the Assistant Curate in the Parish of Harnham. I will have been here a year in June and one of the joys of my curacy has been building relationships with Willowcroft, the Care Home on Odstock Road. Willowcroft provides specialist dementia, residential, and respite care. This is life lived at the fragile edge of society.



I have discovered that inside, time behaves differently. Conversations begin and dissolve. Names are misplaced and there is a lot of sleeping happening which is wonderfully peaceful. And yet, despite the dismantling of memory and slowness, something essential remains. Care Homes like Willowcroft are built not only to meet physical needs but to nurture emotional and even spiritual wellbeing, recognising that a person is more than their illness.

As a part of that spiritual wellbeing, Harnham churches are working with local care homes to offer that Christian support. Recently I had the joy of leading a Mothers Day service at Willowcroft. We sang some familiar hymns - "all things bright and beautiful" - and shared some stories about how our mothers shaped us.

A resident hums a hymn she cannot name. Another asks, again and again, if her mother is coming - though she herself is nearly ninety! These are not failures of personhood. They are glimpses of a deeper truth - that identity is not held together by memory alone.

Care in places like Willowcroft is slow, repetitive, and deeply relational. The staff are so welcoming and kind and really do see the personalities. Staff learn life stories, preferences, fragments of personality.

Christian theology speaks of a God who loves us simply because we are. In a place like Willowcroft, that idea becomes visible. Here, love is patient beyond reason. It keeps showing up. It holds onto people who are, in many ways, letting go of themselves. It does not depend on memory, performance, or reciprocity.

It begins to look like grace. We are still loved.

What can we seek to achieve in Christian Aid Week 2026 10 -16 May?



Growing hope in a small city space ...
in Nairobi,

Fridah is using urban farming to protect her family
from hunger and build a more secure future.

This Christian Aid Week, your support could help mothers in Nairobi, Kenya, facing the devastating reality of urban poverty and the daily struggle to feed their children. Most parents wake every single day knowing that they must go and earn money, otherwise their children won't eat that evening.

For Fridah Moraa, this pressure is constant. She is a recently widowed grandmother and the sole provider for her family. Rent, school costs, water and food all depend on what she can earn. Fridah lives in Dagoretti, an informal settlement in Nairobi, with her children and grandson in a rented corrugated metal shelter. There is no running water and space is extremely limited. Many families in Dagoretti manage just two meals a day. Some manage only one.

To support her family, Fridah sells vegetables at a market stall. With no refrigeration or storage, she travels long distances to buy produce, six days a week. Some days she earns enough. Some days she does not.

'Sometimes I don't know how I'll buy food. I don't know how I'll feed my family. When I wake up, I have many worries. Sometimes I don't have food. Now I'm responsible for everything.'

Fridah's situation began to change when she joined Imarisha Kilimo, an urban farming project run by Christian Aid's partner, Beacon of Hope. At first, the idea felt impossible. *'I was wondering, where can someone farm here in Nairobi?'*, she said. But through Beacon of Hope, she's received tools, seeds and training to grow fresh vegetables in a small city space – food she can cook for her family or sell to earn income.

Through training, tools and seeds, Fridah learned how to grow food in small city spaces. She learned how to use cone gardens, make compost and conserve water. At the end of a narrow alley near her home Fridah now tends her own urban farm. She grows kale, tomatoes and indigenous vegetables. Some feed her family. Some she sells. For Fridah this means more than food. It means stability and choice.

'I discovered I could sow here. Right where I stand. Now I can plan. I can buy this; I can buy that. I can help my family. It's hard, but in God I trust, for the strength to keep going every day.'

Fridah's faith sustains her through difficult days. It strengthens her resolve to keep going and to provide for her children. Her urban farm is small, but it carries big hopes. Hopes for education, independence and a future beyond daily uncertainty.

As in previous years, early in the week commencing Sunday 10 May we will be delivering envelopes door-to-door in the parish with suggestions as to how you can give, including electronically with the QR code below which will take you to the Salisbury Churches' dedicated Christian Aid donation page.

Lent Talks - reflections

Four evening talks, followed by the service of Compline, focused on what it means in action to 'do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God.'

Revd. Becky led the first session with an overview of social justice. As well as examples from the Bible and social science, she and Neil had been on the Salisbury Tourist Trail featuring different sites or historical statues of upholders of justice. The 14th century Poultry Cross gave poultry sellers a fair site to sell their produce, whilst one of the early statues on the outer walls of the Cathedral showed the bishop who had pioneered education for boys who would otherwise have remained uneducated. We can be grateful for such expressions of social justice and seek ways to continue them today.

Our second evening on social justice in the countryside was led by Revd. Jonathan Plows, Rector of the Wylde and Till Valley Benefice and Rural Dean of Stonehenge Deanery. He spoke of the needs of farmers, the changing landscape and its effects on the land - facts we may know from TV programmes such as 'Countryfile'- but are also much closer to us in reality. His churches provide contact points, social meeting places where people can gather, eat and share rather than remain isolated.

Our third evening was led by Sir Al Aynsley Green on social justice and health. His own early life in a northern mining community and his struggle to become a medical doctor resulted in his deep concern and compassion for those needing medical help, especially children. He became the first National Clinical Director for Children in the Government Department of Health, then Children's Commissioner for England and President of the BMA. Sir Al told us about the Harvard Hospital on Harnham Down and its evolution from a hospital for infectious diseases to a military hospital then to a Common Cold Research Unit. As a journalist once wrote of him 'Al Aynsley Green has got it right! There is a crisis at the heart of our society.' We are fortunate to have him living here in Harnham.

Our final evening centred on education and who better than Helen Donnelly, Head Teacher of Harnham Primary School, to speak to us. Sometimes social need can be hidden and only come to light by perceptive teachers. With changing demographics and economic burdens, educational pressures have increased. It was both moving and encouraging to hear of the initiatives being taken to support pupils in our local school. And if any interested adults are available to give children help with reading, they would be welcome! What an excellent series with plenty of food for thought, thanks, prayer and challenge.

Can you imagine collecting 86 animals from the wild in East Africa and then travelling with them by train and boat so they could be distributed to zoos in Europe and America?

This is what Revd Barney Hopkinson got involved in as a School leaver. Barney's Rolleiflex photographs and memories from the time charmed, informed and entertained Spire u3a at the April meeting.

He showed us the primitive conditions the team lived in, explained the practices they developed to transport the animals safely and divulged the embarrassing state he was in when he realised that the zebras he was guarding one night were being attacked by lions. The process took some months, a big learning curve and a lot of ingenuity, in order to restock zoos that had been depleted in WW2. Previous expeditions had suffered many losses through poor animal care during transportation but after this expedition zoological societies were better placed to establish vital breeding programmes.

Who knew that some zebras are horses but others are not? Who knew that giraffes have prehensile lips? Thank you, Barney.

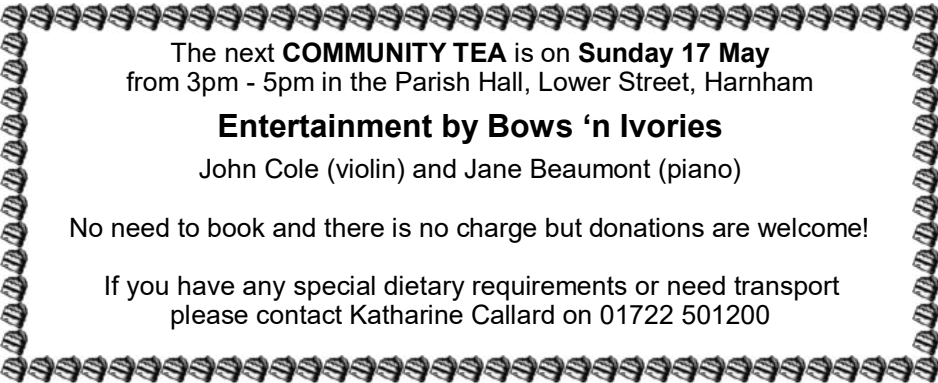

Easter Experience

For two days on the week before the Easter holidays, a team from Harnham Parish transformed the Harnham Junior School into an Easter Experience. Over two days, 165 pupils and the staff visited the hall, participated in drama, activities and reflective prayer in order to understand the story of Easter.

The story of Easter was split into five stations

Palm Sunday – the children waved six-foot palms and made their own paper palms and re-enacted Jesus riding into Jerusalem with a wooden donkey.

Maundy Thursday – the children learnt about the Last Supper and Jesus washing the disciples feet. They were invited to reflect on how they serve others by washing each other's hands.

Good Friday – the children learnt about the sadness of the cross. A heavy burden. They were asked to feel the weight of a heavy bag of worries (stones) and to reflect on what things they are concerned about and draw or write them down placing them in a six-foot cross. We hope they left feeling lighter.

Easter – the children entered a garden to learn about new life and the Resurrection. They felt their own pulses and considered what WOW moments make them feel fully alive as well as their responses to the Easter Resurrection of Jesus.

The final station was a reflective corner with poems to reflect further.

What impact did this have?

- Some children had never washed another person's hands before. A new experience.
- Some children understood better how Jesus' celebrity status was not used to keep power but to help others.
- As adults we learnt that some of the worries of children are very real and concern the wars in the Middle East, the changes in the environment as well as worries about family and friendships.
- Children had fun in learning about Christianity and the Easter story was brought to life more than through pure listening- It was really immersive using imaginative play.
- Trust building with Harnham Parish volunteers and getting to know the children more.
- Children are very insightful - they can reflect well, given the opportunity to do so. Some of their reflections we will never know!

It was

400 years ago, on 4 May 1626 that the Dutch explorer Peter Minuit arrived on the east coast of what is now the USA. He negotiated the purchase of Manhattan Island from the Lenape Native Americans for \$24 worth of cloth and buttons. (Equal to about \$1,150 today.)

300 years ago, on 25 May 1726 that the world's first Circulating Library (lending library) was launched by Scottish poet and bookseller Allan Ramsay at his bookshop in Edinburgh.

200 years ago, on 29 May 1826 that Ebenezer Butterick, American tailor was born. He and his wife invented tissue paper dress patterns in multiple sizes, and thereby revolutionised home dressmaking.

175 years ago, from 1 May to 15 October 1851 that the Great Exhibition was held in The Crystal Palace, Hyde Park. More than 10,000 exhibitors attended what is regarded as the first World's Fair.

100 years ago, on 4 to 12 May 1926 that the UK's General Strike was held. The Trade Union Congress (TUC) called a General Strike in support of 1.2 million coal miners. The strike lasted nine days, and had little effect.

90 years ago, on 7 May 1936 that British aviator Amy Johnson made the fastest-ever (at that time) solo flight from England to Cape Town.

Also 90 years ago, on 27 May 1936 that the RMS Queen Mary began her maiden voyage, sailing from Southampton to New York.

80 years ago, on 11 May 1946 that the first CARE packages for Europe arrived in Le Havre, to help people who were starving after WWII.

75 years ago, on 3 May 1951 that the Festival of Britain and the Royal Festival Hall in London were opened.

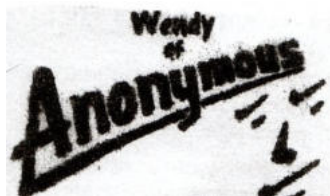

At this time when we remember the birth of Your church, may we open our hearts to receive Your Spirit afresh and move into each new day confident that we are yours and that in You is our true security.

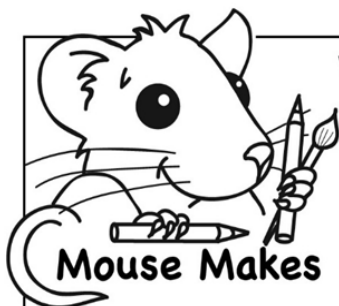
