From Jacqui Brown, Lay Worship Leader

Dear All,

As we all know, despite its name coming from the Latin for 'seven', September is for us, the ninth month of the year and has been since around 400BC, although, here in the Northern Hemisphere, it feels like a New Year especially for those in the education system with the new school / college year starting. For farmers, the grain harvest has finished, and they start to plan next year's planting schedule; probably looking for drought resistant crops and praying for a bit more rain as well.

The Church traditionally celebrates Harvest Festival and Creationtide in September. The theme for Creationtide this year, rather aptly (or ironically), is 'Living Water' based on Ezekiel chapter 47, verses 1-12, - water flowing from the Temple.

The first Sunday in September has now been designated The Festival (or Feast) of Creation in Christ by the World Council of Churches. This is the first new festival to be added to the Liturgical Calendar since 1983. It is hoped that as well as giving thanks for God's gift of creation, people will recognise their responsibility to cherish it and also engage in environmental tasks such as litter picking or tree planting.

Tree planting may be more necessary than ever this year after such a long period of hot dry weather. I fear that I have lost my plum tree this summer. This was a special tree to me, as it was a sapling from my parents' tree in Hertfordshire, which in turn was a sapling from my grandfather's plum tree in Salisbury, so I always felt that it had come home! (Although technically, 'home' was on the long-lost St Paul's Allotments, now under several feet of tarmac!)

Like the farmers, I too need to reconsider the planting in my garden. I also need to keep reviewing my environmental impact on the world, from what I buy to how I use my car. Perhaps you might wish to use the first Sunday in September to consider if you are able to make any changes to your daily activities.

So, as well as giving thanks for the harvest and taking time to care for our planet, we should also remember in our prayers all those who are starting in new classes or colleges this month and Revd Becky and Neil as they move from Harnham to Bridport for an exciting new challenge.

Hello - Goodbye - Hello!

Whilst clearing out some of my study, I came across the first parish magazine I received through the Vicarage door after my installation in January 2013. The cover was bright yellow paper with a very old logo of the parish church buildings and the words 'HELLO Becky and Neil' emblazoned on the cover! It reminded me of the welcome I received and of how much has changed over the years in Harnham - even the stationery has not remained stationary!

Hellos -

It is easy to name the obvious hellos -

New EVENTS; the first Pet Festival and Fun dog shows; the first Parish, Salisbury City Council, Harnham Community Network and local uniformed organisations uniting for Harnham Fun Day and Fete; the first Film Nights in Harnham Parish Hall and Churches for Black History Month, Lent or the family sing-a-long films.

New types of WORSHIP in the form of the outdoor services and the Drive around Nativity with over 900 people walking or driving around the parish to see the nativity stations; the first Christmas Morning service outside during Covid; the first Jazz Evensong and Folk Mass or the introduction of the Sermon Series'; the prayer trees in church and guided prayer walks around the new and now newer estates; Ascension Day prayers from the top of Harnham Slope; the Lenten scratch choir, Beer and Carols; Africa Sunday; Messy Church; a new Bridge Chaplain who will begin in Harnham Junior School in September.

GROWTH in leadership and faith as I have learnt alongside you and encouraged new church wardens, lay worship leaders, licenced lay ministers and intercessors. New fresh expressions that have grown into fellowship Pause for Prosecco, Pause for Thought in the Pub, as well as numerous new members on the Parochial Church Council serving their church community for a while. Growth too in new technology with positive online communications, social media channels of pastoral services, and the recording of sermons and Evening Prayer services.

So much good work has taken place thanks to the 'Team Harnham' team whilst I have been here. So much has had an impact; a church community that is more deeply engaged with the wider community bringing people together; congregations that are even more welcoming and diverse; a hall that has become more eco and user friendly AND is becoming more accessible. Messy Church which remains the worshipping community with the most diverse and youngest people who come along.

It is perhaps more difficult to name the hellos of the long work of God - where the immeasurable love of God and Jesus has been at work within each one changing us to love in the ways of Resurrected life. Only you can take time to reflect and name the ways this change has come.

Goodbyes -

Of course, there have been endings in the last thirteen years; some forms of worship, such as regular Evensongs which were mostly only attended by those who were on duty, so they stopped; members of our worshipping community moved away to be nearer family; the ancient Riso copier and shipping container have moved on too! Many people whom we have loved, have died and we miss them.

And now it is time for me to say goodbye. Each of us have losses, so too did Jesus. He was not spared the ache or the struggle of saying goodbye and letting go. It began with a goodbye from the security of his hometown from which the Spirit pulled him forth into a whole new world of ministry - with the power to say goodbye in order to say hello. His life became a continual journey of deep investment and letting go, rooting and uprooting, settling and moving. He allowed himself to develop friendships, to love deeply knowing it would mean the cost of farewell. With compassion, he comforted others in their own goodbyes as well as in his own farewell meal and speech. His message was clear- do not be afraid, trust because there is always the hello of Resurrection. For me this is not a glib answer, but a movement within us, if we allow it, towards growth, change and newness. We all have the capacity to learn from goodbyes, and this gives us hope.

St Paul writes - I think that what we suffer in this life - the goodbyes - can never be compared to the glory - the hello - as yet unrevealed which is waiting for us. Romans 8 v 18.

I wonder where you find hope in your goodbye times?

Joyce Rupp writes, 'We have come from journeys filled with hello and goodbye. In the midst of our joys and sorrows, we know that all is a gift and that we have a God whose faithful presence radiates love and hope to us.'

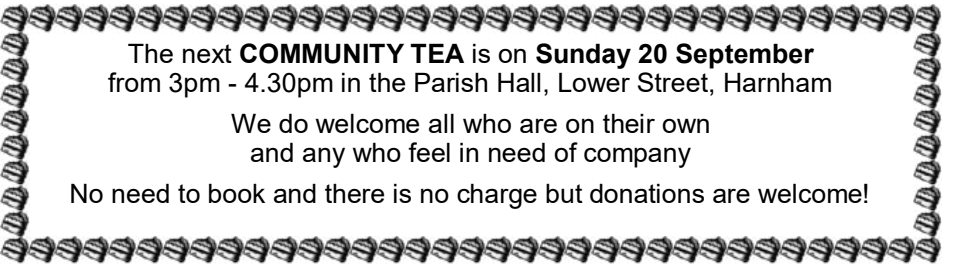
A GREAT DAY IN THE SUN

'Fabulous afternoon!' 'So many happy people!' These were just some of the comments that people made as they left this year's Harnham Fun Day and Parish Fete on Saturday 25 July in and around Harnham Parish and Scout Halls in Lower Street. Other people said 'Everything was lovely', 'It was busier and livelier than past years', they 'loved it all'. The sun shone brightly, as we had hoped, and the weather and the advance publicity drew around 800 people to the event, mainly families, from across Harnham and beyond.

As last year, the Climbing Wall provided by Wiltshire Outdoor Learning Team and funded by a grant from Salisbury City Council, received particular accolades. Jodie the Face Painter generously provided by Wiltshire Council Housing was also undoubtedly a winner with the kids. But there was so much more, catering for every taste. The cream teas that the Parish team provided were described as 'amazing' alongside the very popular ice-cream cones, while there was a steady queue for the Hot Dogs (and ice pops and drinks) served by the Scouts. The variety of stalls was commented on, and those who won raffle prizes, or bottles on the tombola were well pleased. The Harnham Community Network held its first sharing Harvest Table for the summer, to be followed every Saturday morning till October. We were delighted to welcome PCSO Charlotte King and her colleague from the Neighbourhood Policing Team, and there was a constant stream of youngsters in and out of their patrol car. We were also greatly honoured that the Mayor of Salisbury, Councillor Jenny Bolwell, with her consort Tom Corbin, opened the event, drew the winning raffle tickets, and stayed for most of the afternoon visiting stalls and talking to the volunteers.

Of course, an event like this would never happen without the huge efforts of so many volunteers, involved, as acknowledged by our Vicar, Revd Becky, in 'planning, organising, collecting, arranging, donating, setting up/taking down, being involved on the day and supporting it in any way, performing, joining the fun, etc'! A huge thank you to everyone. Not only was a great time had by all, but also the Parish stalls and activities raised over £2,700 to support the work of the Parish, and the Scouts and Guides also raised much needed funds.

There are always lessons to be learned, and these will be considered by the planning group drawn from the Parish and the Scouts, so that next year's Fun Day and Parish Fete can be even more successful. Morris Dancing is a genuinely ancient English art with roots going back many centuries and lots of varying traditions from different areas of the country. “Sarum Morris” is a leading Morris side, dancing for many local events and in all sorts of venues near and far. For those of us who look on it's fascinating but also rather mysterious, so we're privileged to have an opportunity to see these expert exponents of the dance perform for us. In fact, not only will they perform, they'll also tell us something of the history of the dance and its deeper meanings, so its demonstration and explanation. This is a FWT not to be missed.

Safeguarding Update

There are three things that I would like to draw your attention to:

Lone-Worker Guidance – This guidance has recently been updated. It is relevant to anyone who has cause to enter Parish property on their own e.g. to set up for a service; to clean; to arrange flowers. It also contains guidance for anyone who visits on behalf of the church. Copies are available in both churches. Please contact me if you would like an electronic copy. Please do report ANY instance which makes you feel uneasy as this helps us build up a bigger picture. Please also complete the visit register to record your visit to the church as this may help us identify the period when an incident may have occurred e.g. there was no damage when A cleaned at 10am but the box was broken when B went to lock up at 5pm.

Guidelines for Volunteers – This has been developed after a couple of incidents and is designed to ensure that our wonderful volunteers are not at risk of false accusations or putting themselves at risk. As the Parish lift scheme is currently suspended, it includes guidance on giving lifts. Again, there will be copies in both churches, or I can send you an electronic copy if you would prefer.

Many of you attended the training session with Jonathan Whiter in September 2023. This means that most in the Parish will soon need to repeat their safeguarding training! Jonathan has unfortunately left the diocese, so we are no longer able to arrange a similar session. If you are able to do so, the training is available online and is accessed via The Church of England Safeguarding Training Portal. You will need to create an account if you do not already have one. The training you need to access is the Foundation level Safeguarding training. The course takes about 60-90 minutes. If you are unable to access this online, please contact me. Once I have an idea of numbers, I will arrange a face-to-face session. It does seem to take considerably longer in the group session though.

There are also lots of dog-friendly pubs – in fact the only one that is not dog-friendly is called The Greyhound (*an ironic pub name fact*); and it is only a short walk to the beach - although I am not allowed on the nearest beach between May and September (*a frustrating canine exclusion zone fact*).

My new house is called The Rectory because Revd Canon Becky is not going to be a Vicar but is going to be a Rector (*an historical ecclesiastical title fact*). After the Norman Conquest (*a '1066 and all that!' fact*) Bridport Rectory belonged to the religious house of St Wandrille – a Benedictine Monastery near Fontenelle in Normandy – at least it did until Henry VIII had his little spat with the Holy Father (*a Reformation fact for which Neil is actually very grateful as it created his job as Clerke to the Master of Faculties "to wrytte and regestre every suche licence dispensacion facultie wrytyng or other instrument to be graunted by the seid Archebishope and shall fynde parchment wexe and sylken laces convenyent for the same"- Ecclesiastical Licences Act 1533, Section V*). St Wandrille's Feast Day is 22 July (*an excuse for a party fact*) - even more so because the monks still brew their own Saint-Wandrille Beer!

The Rectory has a very big garden for me and my chickens to play in, but it also has very shiny and slippery (for dog paws at least) wooden floors downstairs which will take a bit of getting used to (*an “an old dog will have to learn new tricks” fact*).

I will miss my Salisbury walks, especially stopping at my favourite High Street coffee shop, Sonder, which is very dog friendly and where all the staff like me. I hope to see many of you around Harnham before we go.

The Bridge Youth Project is a Salisbury-based Christian charity that has been supporting schools since 1994 through chaplaincy, pastoral care, and wellbeing initiatives. Bridge project Lay Chaplains provide a trusted, caring presence within schools, offering emotional and spiritual support to pupils, staff, and families, while helping to nurture the Christian ethos and values of the school community. They work alongside school staff to promote wellbeing, lead collective worship, support Religious Education, and provide a listening ear for those who need it.

The Parochial Church Council of Harnham have decided to fund a two year appointment of a Bridge Chaplain for our local Harnham C of E Junior School. Headteacher Helen Donnelly approached the Bridge in 2025 on her arrival to ask if a Bridge chaplain was possible, as more support was needed for children and families as 1/5 pupils are on pupil premium (defined as a household income less than £7500 per annum) however there was not capacity. Excitingly this summer term, between the Bridge, Harnham Junior School and Harnham PCC this has been made possible! Reverend Sophie will still be one of the foundation governors and supporting staff wellbeing. And our wonderful team, Katy Carter and Michael Camp will still be engaged in collective worship.

As a PCC we have decided to commit to a total investment of £8500 over two years total. We will be fundraising and applying for grants. This includes the Lay Chaplain, courses, lessons and the Bridge cover all recruitment and admin. This investment reflects the Church's commitment to the wellbeing and flourishing of children and families in the local community, providing an invaluable source of pastoral care, encouragement, and hope within the school.

Last month I was invited to a walk along 'Broken Bridges'. I had envisioned a walk to discover more about the new developments and protection of the area. How mistaken can one be? I was taken on a 'Deep Time Walk' and discovered so very much more.

"A Deep Time Walk is a transforming journey through 4.6 billion years of Earth history via a guided walk. It is an invitation to question our relationship with Planet earth, to change our perception of the world and our place within living ecosystems".

Paul Stoney was our guide as we gently strolled along Broken Bridges, into Churchfields and back, covering 4.6 km, representing the 4.6 billion years. We stopped at strategic places to learn more about the earth's amazing evolution, and its developments over these billions of years, starting, you will remember in a small, miniscule area, even small than a pinhead (see July article)

Paul is organising another such walk on Sunday 18 October, meeting at 2.00pm on the bend of Middle Street and Upper Street, ready to set off along Broken Bridges. I would strongly urge you to join the walk if at all possible. It is a truly transformative experience. (see below)

Professor Iain Stewart describes it this way "What a gem! A powerful scientific and geo-poetic evocation of how humanity is woven into the fabric of earth's remarkable past. Fascinating and humbling in equal measure"

Archbishop of Canterbury's Visit to Ghana Highlights Faith, Reconciliation and Public Service.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Revd. and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally, recently concluded a significant visit to Ghana marked by worship, high level courtesy calls, heritage reflection and renewed emphasis on Christian service. Her visit formed part of a wider pastoral tour of the Church of the Province of West Africa and carried particular importance as one of her first major visits to Africa since assuming office as Archbishop of Canterbury.

In Ghana, the Archbishop engaged with church leaders, public officials, traditional authority, students, women's groups and local congregations. One of the defining moments of the visit was her sermon at St Joseph the Worker Anglican Church in Kaneshie, Accra Ghana, where she preached at a service led entirely by female clergy. The service represented the increasing prominence of women in church leadership and was both historic and symbolic. In her sermon, Archbishop Mullally drew attention to the assurance of God's love and presence, encouraging Christians to remain firm in faith even in times of uncertainty and difficulty.

The Archbishop also paid a courtesy call on the President of Ghana, His Excellency John Dramani Mahama, at the Jubilee House (the seat of government). The meeting added a diplomatic dimension to the visit, underlining the continuing relationship between Ghana, the Anglican Communion and the United Kingdom. It also reflected the role of religious leadership in supporting peace, public service and moral responsibility in national life.

In Kumasi, Archbishop Mullally visited the Manhyia Palace, where she met His Majesty Otumfuo Osei Tutu II, the Asantehene. The meeting with the King of the Asante Kingdom brought together traditional authority and clerical leadership which was culturally significant. Later, she delivered a sermon at an Evensong service at Manhyia Palace, emphasising the spiritual resources entrusted to Christian communities, faith, and stewardship.

Beyond the formal engagements, the Archbishop's visit also had strong pastoral and social dimensions. She met members of the Mothers' Union in Accra, encouraging them in their work of supporting families, literacy, community development and women's ministry. She also visited St Monica's Nursing and Midwifery Training College in the Ashanti Region, where she addressed students and opened a new clinic named in her honour. Her interactions with healthcare students had particular significance for her as a former nurse and reaffirmed the Christian call to compassion, care and service.

Another important part of the visit was her engagement with Ghana's history and heritage. At Cape Coast Castle, a major site associated with the transatlantic slave trade, the Archbishop considered the terrible history of slavery and the necessity of recollection, remorse, justice, and reconciliation. This gave the visit a deeper moral relevance beyond ceremonial worship.

Overall, Archbishop Mullally's visit to Ghana was significant for both Church and nation. It strengthened relations within the Anglican Communion, affirmed women's leadership, recognised Ghana's traditional and political institutions, encouraged young people in healthcare, and connected Christian mission with reconciliation and public service. Her visit showed that faith remains relevant not only in worship, but also in leadership, healing, justice and national development.

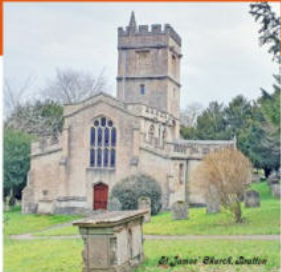

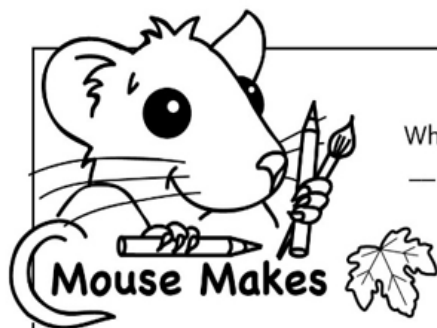
